The New York State meeting of the National Catholic Music Educators Association has rounded out a complete and interesting program for the one-day parley scheduled for Apr. 29 at Nazareth College.

Sectional meetings and demonstration programs of interest to music teachers, organists, school superintendents and principals have been planned by the committee on arrangements. A panel discussion with Philip Kreckel, famous local organist as leader, will be of interest to delegates interested in the organ. Taking part in the discussion will be Sister M. Grace Clare, S.S.J., Sister M. Alexius, R.S.M., and the Misses Monroe Servais, B.S., and Virginia Bergman, B.S.

Bring Greetings

Alfred Spouse, head of Vocal music in Rochester public schools, will extend a greeting to the delegates as President of the Eastern Music Educators' conference. Dean Harrington, president of the New York State School Music Association, will also address the gathering.

In the demonstration set up, programs, helpful to teachers of the grades, high school or college level, are listed on the schedule. Nazareth College String Ensemble under the direction of Sister M. Kathleen, S.S.J., and the College Glee Club under Mr. Austin Truitt will be heard.

Raymond Hasenauer will give a demonstration with the inter-parochial orchestra. Patricia Finch, a pupil of Mother Carmel, O.S.F., will play a piano solo. In the high school group, the Madrigal Singers from Nazareth Academy under the direction of Sister Rose Teresa, S.S.J., will perform. Students from St. Agnes High School under Sister Agnes Teresa, S.S.J., will be heard in violin selections while instrumental solos will be given by Aquinas students.

Vocal High School problems will be discussed by Austin Truitt, an authority on choral work and radio technique. A piano forum is scheduled headed by Mrs. Helen Ankner-Kondolf. Raymond Hasenauer will lead the discussion on teaching instrumental music to elementary and high school pupils. Opens with Mass.

Rev. Leo C. Mooney, pastor of St. Patrick's, will be celebrant of the Mass at 9 o'clock, opening the session. The assembly will sing the ordinary of the Mass, while Nazareth Novitiate Choir will sing the proper. Rev. Benedict Ehmann will direct the singing and Sister M. Grace Clare, S.S.J., will be at the organ.

His Excellency will extend the welcome to the various delegates at the opening session. Included in the representatives register up to date are Very Rev. Msgr. William Kelly, New York City; Dr. H. Seitz, Detroit; Rev. James Callaghan, Syracuse; Sister M. Scholastica, I.H.M., Scranton, Pa.

Archbishop Stritch Listed for Press Talk

MILWAUKEE.—When the Catholic Press Association meets here May 11 to 13, at the invitation of the Most Rev. Moses E. Kiley, Archbishop of Milwaukee, it will be the 33rd annual convention of the organized Catholic Press in the United States.

The C.P.A. was founded Aug. 24, 1911, in Columbus, O., under the guidance of Dr. Thomas P. Hart, now Editor Emeritus of the Cincinnati Catholic Telegraph, and the Most Rev. James J. Hartley, Bishop of Columbus, and others. The first President was Edward J. Cooney, Manager of the Providence Visitor, Providence, R. I. Catholic publications of 4,000,000 total circulation readers now comprise the C.P.A. membership.

The Most Rev. Samuel A. Stritch, Archbishop of Chicago, formerly of the Milwaukee Archdiocese, will be the speaker at the Convention dinner. His subject will be "The Papal Peace Plan."


