

Field Missionaries To Feature Program On Inter-School 'Day'

Religious education in rural areas, the Church in Latin-America, and the Church and the Negro will highlight the discussions at the Inter-School Mission Day scheduled for May 18 at Nazareth Academy.

Catechist Margaret Campbell of the Society of Missionary Catechists will direct a panel discussion on rural missions. She enjoys ten years of missionary experience gained in the rural regions of Indiana, Iowa, Texas, and California.

The Rev. William Perez, a. m. editor of *The Marianist* magazine and *Archbishop Prentiss*, will talk on Latin-American Relations at the morning general assembly and lead a panel discussion of Latin America in the afternoon.

At a third panel discussion the Rev. Msgr. William McCann, pastor of St. Charles Borromeo Church in Harlem, New York City, will explain Catholic missionary work among the Negroes.

Also participating in the discussion on the Negro will be T. Everett Johnson, Negro leader from New York City, who is currently an assistant director of the U. S. in Geneva, N. Y. Mr. Johnson has the special charge of providing recreational programs for the Negro sailors quartered at the Sampson Naval Training Station.

Opening the day's mission activities will be a Pontifical Mass celebrated by His Excellency Bishop James Kearney. Sermon at the Mass will be delivered by the Very Rev. Msgr. Edward Fraking, National Secretary of the Catholic Students' Mission Crusade.

Following Benediction in the afternoon there will be a social program of dancing and music in the Nazareth Academy Gymnasium. Music will be provided by the Aquinas Swingsters. Social activities will be in charge of Marie Cole and Connie Smith of the Academy and the Sacred Heart.

Knights of St. John Hear Call to Catholic Activity As State Delegates Meet

Inspired by stirring calls to Catholic activity now, to be prepared for postwar problems, delegates to the New York Grand Commandery and Ladies' Auxiliary, Knights of St. John two-day convention returned

home to carry the enthusiastic messages to their local commanderies.

Sessions of the New York State Knights of St. John and ladies were held at Hotel Seneca with church services at St. Joseph's Church and a social gathering at St. Michael's Hall.

Highlighting a busy program was the convention dinner held Sunday at the Seneca at which national and state officers and clergy were guests of honor.

Bishop's Message

His Excellency, Bishop Kearney was present to welcome the visiting knights to the Rochester diocese. In his address the Bishop referred to the cross that is featured on knight's uniform, stationery and programs.

In a postwar world, His Excellency told them, they, like St. John the Baptist, their patron, must be the "voice of one crying in the wilderness" of modern material standards and principles, a voice crying for the principles and practice of all that is good and true, and that like the procession entering the church, they must enter the postwar world, wearing and carrying the crucifix.

Speaking at the dinner Clarence J. Pfeifer of Syracuse hit out at the allurement of the "god of gold" and materialism. The necessity of giving some consideration to material things of life was noted but into that some, he said, can be taken the doctrines and teachings of the sign of the cross.

"If we are true Knights," he asserted, "we can enlighten those who follow the unscrupulous, unknown leadership behind the god of gold." Religion is the cement of all institutions. And after the war you will have an opportunity to establish commanderies in many places. You must prepare to be real leaders."

A greeting from Mayor Samuel R. Dickie and the keynote address by the Rev. Dr. Joseph H. Coffey, regimental chaplain opened the convention Saturday afternoon. Colonel Frederick J. Wegman, commanding Rochester Regiment presided.

Reverend Address

That there will be peace until the world admits that there is no discrimination between men, color, and status, was the view of Father Coffey who declared that "Individual rights will be recognized when the world once more recognizes the truth of the fatherhood of God and the brotherhood of man."

He gave the knights for their slogan: "That Knights may not perish but that Knights may flourish."
