

**Nation's Highest Award  
To be Presented to Mother  
of Hero Slain at Tarawa**

**HAN ANTONIO**—Highest decoration of the nation to its heroes, the Congressional Medal of Honor, has been awarded posthumously to Sgt. William J. Bordelon, of the U. S. Marine Corps, who was killed in action at Tarawa last November 20. He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. William J. Bordelon, members of San Jose parish, here. His mother will receive the medal in his name at a public ceremony in Alamo Stadium on Saturday, June 17, it has been announced.

The presentation will be made by Maj. D. M. Taft, in charge of the San Antonio office of the Marine Corps. Brother Thomas Bordelon, Rev. Father of Sgt. Bordelon, stationed in Dayton, will come here for the ceremony, as will two of the hero's friends, Sgt. Eiden H. Beers and Cpl. Phillip R. Burke, who served with him at Tarawa and now are convalescing at a Naval Hospital in San Diego. A detachment of 35 Marines, mostly veterans of the war in the South Pacific, will be flown here for the ceremony.

Central Catholic High School, alma mater of Sergeant Bordelon, will be represented by its band and F.L.O.T.C. unit, while students of Blessed Sacrament Academy and St. Joseph's Academy, which he attended, will also participate in the ceremony.

MILWAUKEE, WIS.—The latest book by the Rev. W. M. Orchard, D.D., renowned English writer, lecturer and convert from the Anglican ministry, has been released by the Bruce Publishing Co. here.

Entitled "Humanity: What? Whence? Whither?" it answers man's everlasting question of "where he is going, where he came from and what he is here for," in a concise historical and philosophic survey which opens the path to Catholic truth.

Well qualified to present a powerful and popular appeal for Catholicism, Father Orchard found his way into the Catholic Church through the Presbyterian and Congregational religions. At one time the minister at the King's Weigh House, Father Orchard had been a prominent Protestant minister for 22 years when he joined the Catholic Church in 1932. He was ordained a Catholic priest in 1936. Since that time he has gained recognition as a missionary and lecturer, traveling throughout England and visiting the United States on occasion. At present he is pastor of Gloucester parish and acts as honorary psychological consultant to a near-by mental hospital.

An executive of the Pax movement he also turned his literary talent to Catholic apologetics when he joined the Church and has written several outstanding scholarly volumes including "The Newman of the Church" and "The Way of Simplicity."

**Chinese Catholic  
Is Named U. S. Envoy  
To Chungking**

NEW YORK.—Albert Lee, prominent Catholic member of the Boston Chinese community, has been sent by the U. S. State Department on a secret mission to Chungking.

Born in Tsi Shan, China, 32 years ago, Mr. Lee came to the United States as a youth. His father is a member of the Kow Ming Tung, the Chinese national committee. Mr. Lee attended Northeastern University and Boston College, and returned to China to attend Sun Yat Sen University. He came back to the United States and went into business in Boston, where he soon took a leading part in Chinese affairs.

A member of the Immaculate Conception Parish, Boston, Mr. Lee was instructed and received into the Catholic Church by the Most Rev. Paul Yu Pin, Vicar Apostolic of Nanking, in 1938.
