

Nazareth College to Mark 20th Anniversary Sept. 24

17 Graduation Classes to Take Part in Program

Nazareth College will celebrate the Twentieth Anniversary of its founding on Sunday, Sept. 24, with the offering of a Solemn Mass of Thanksgiving in the convent chapel by the Most Rev. James E. Kearney, Bishop of Rochester, and Chancellor of the College.

A full program for the day has been planned by the various committees of students, alumnae and faculty.

Nazareth College has graduated seventeen classes of young women of Rochester and of the various towns in the Catholic Diocese of Rochester, of all parts of the State of New York and far beyond its limits. Its Alumnae are scattered "to a surprising extent" over this country and far beyond our own borders.

The coming celebration will call back all the young women who were students at the College along those twenty years, and especially the graduates of its seventeen classes.

Nazareth College was founded at the instance of the Most Rev. Thomas F. Hickey, then Bishop of Rochester. Its legal existence, character and status were derived from an act of the Legislature of New York State, by which it was empowered to establish its seven departments and grant degrees of Arts and Science. The Board of the State Regents directed its particular formation and granted the final State approval before the first class was graduated and its first degrees were given. Up to the present 739 degrees have been given by the institution.

Christian Brothers Run 18 Argentine Schools

NEW YORK (NC)—In addition to the Colegio De La Salle, largest institution of its kind in Buenos Aires, the Christian Brothers conduct 17 schools in Argentina, administering to more than 5,000 pupils, 3,000 of whom receive a free education, according to statistics made public by Manhattan College. The college and schools are staffed by about 200 Christian Brothers.

C. conference, president of her Sophomore class and Secretary of the Junior class. A member of the Parosian choir, and the orchestra, she also played basketball with the varsity.

Miss McNulty, of Sacred Heart Parish, an active member of the Sodality, belonged to the Athletic Association of Nazareth, and was on the staff of the Lanthorn, the school's yearbook. In addition, she was a faithful mission worker.

Miss Mary Mattie, who graduated in June from Our Lady of Mercy, is the fourth member of the group. She is the daughter of Mr.

and Mrs. Edmund M. Mattie, 184 Grafton. A graduate of St. Andrew's School, she was active throughout high school as a member of the Sodality of Our Lady.

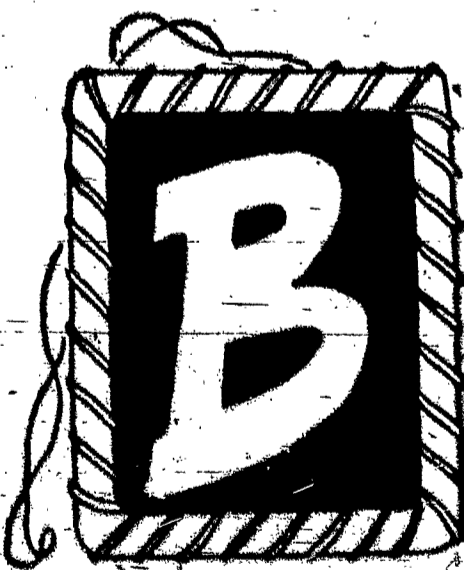

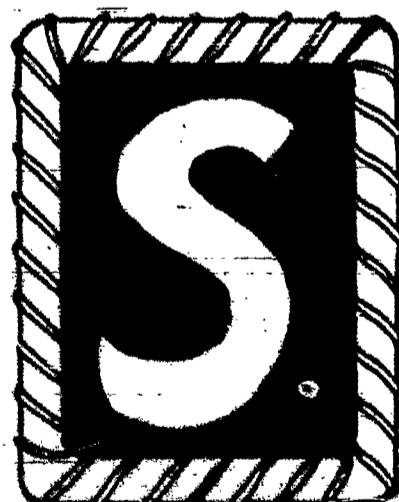
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
