BROOKLYN—The Rev. Edward F. J. Bradley, Army chaplain, has been reported missing in the South Pacific theater of war, according to word received from the War Department by his mother, Mrs. Ann Bradley, here.

Father Bradley studied at Cathedral College here, Immaculate Conception College, Huntington, L. I., and at the North American College in Rome. He was ordained in Rome on Dec. 2, 1935. He was assistant pastor at St. Teresa Church here when commissioned July, 1942.

St. Mary's Parish Is First To Have Full Time Director Of Play Time Program

The Rev. Thomas J. Toole, pastor of St. Mary's Church, announces the appointment of Albie P. Quatrano as Director of Physical Education and Social Recreation for the parish effective at once.

St. Mary's church thus becomes the first parish in the history of Elmira parishes or the Rochester Diocese to sponsor a full time program of this character and it is the intention of Mr. Quatrano to arrange a complete physical program for all grades of the grammar school including calisthenics, folk and tap dancing, apparatus, individual corrective work for students requiring special attention and all other forms of intramural sports for boys and girls such as, volley ball, hockey and outdoor hockey, indoor and outdoor soccer, softball, basketball, basketball, boxing, wrestling, track, touch football, handball, badminton, deck tennis, shuffleboard and ping pong.

Details of this program will be extended to include in this extensive program all High School children of the parish.

A program has been worked out for adult participation in Social Recreation and gym classes will be formed for members of the Holy Name society and members of the Socialities as well as all other men and women of the parish.

Mr. Quatrano is a graduate of St. Anthony's grammar school and South Side high school. He also attended Corland State Normal, Springfield (Mass.) College, Notre Dame, having taken the Boy Guidance and Leadership course at this latter institution, and obtained his Bachelor of Science degree at the American College of Physical Education at Chicago, Ill.

He also attended Long Island University and obtained a certificate qualifying him to instruct in all major sports.

For the past eleven years Mr. Quatrano has been associated with the Elmira Neighborhood House having risen in that organization from a member to Executive Director, a position he has held for the past two years.

He has gained a great deal of knowledge of boys camp life having acted in the capacity of assistant camp director for the Boy Scouts Camp at Camp Seneca and served as camp director for the past three years at Camp Villa Maria.

In addition, Mr. Quatrano has completed a five year course in Boy Scout work, is an Eagle Scout and one of six in the Elmira area who has been awarded the Scoutmaster's Key.

In 1941 the Junior Association of Commerce selected him as the outstanding young Elmiran for that year.

He is a member of the Holy Name Society and Elmira Council, Knights of Columbus, American Association of Physical Education and Elmira Rotary.

In the very near future a complete schedule of activities for the entire parish will be released by Mr. Quatrano.

Sgt. Sokira Reported Safe After Forced Landing

CORNING—Mr. and Mrs. George Pietro, 141 Front St., were happy to receive a letter from their son, Staff Sgt. Charles B. Sokira of the U. S. Air Forces, who was reported missing in action several days ago.

Sgt. Sokira told his parents that due to engine trouble it was necessary to make a forced landing and two weeks elapsed before the plane could be repaired and the crew could return to its "home base." He is now back on active duty.

A further communication from the Fifteenth American Air Force in Italy disclosed the fact that Sgt. Sokira has been awarded the bronze Oak Leaf Cluster for the Air Medal which he was awarded in June.

The young man serves as an engineer gunner in a B-24 Liberator. He has flown over 46 combat missions and has taken part in many raids over German railroad yards, aircraft factories and oil refineries.

Arrest Bishop Who Refused to Say Mass For Vichy Official

NEW YORK (NC)—The Most Rev. Louis Rastoulli, Bishop of Limoges, was arrested by the Gestapo in July and transferred to Chateauroux, the British radio revealed, according to a report received here at the Office of War Information.

The Bishop's arrest, the broadcast said, followed his refusal to offer Mass for Philippe Henriot, Vichy propaganda minister executed by patriots in June. His Excellency refused, the broadcast stated, because the Gestapo had prevented him from holding a service in memory of the victims of the Oradour-sur-Glane massacre in Haute Vienne.

An article by the French Press and Information Service, also reported that the Nazis had killed between 700 and 800 people in the raid on Oradour.
