

3 Catholic Boys from Geneva Make the Supreme Sacrifice

GENEVA—One Catholic Army officer from here made the supreme sacrifice flying over Italy and two Marines gave their lives for their country in the South Pacific, reports of war casualties reveal this week

Second Lieut. Anthony Nicholas Brell, son of Nicholas Brell of 72 Humbert St., bombardier with the United States Air Forces in Italy, was killed in action on August 15, according to a War Department telegram received by his father. Lieutenant Brell entered the Armed Forces in January, 1942, and received his training at Jefferson Barracks, Mo., and was awarded his wings after training at Tucson, Ariz. He went overseas on June 22, 1944, and has been in Italy with the Air Forces. The young airman participated in bombing missions over enemy territory.

Lieutenant Brell was graduated from Geneva High School in 1936 and from Hobart College in 1941. He attended Georgetown University for two years.

Surviving are his father, Nicholas Brell; one brother, Joseph Anthony Brell, third class Petty Officer, USN, of Columbus, O.; three sisters, Mrs. Anthony Mastranni; Mrs. Sam Mosca and Mrs. Joseph Nigro of Rochester and Mrs. Armand Chester of Geneva.

A solemn requiem Mass for the young man was celebrated on Monday, Sept. 4, at St. Francis de Sales Church.

Another Geneva young man, Corporal William Harding, USMC, has given his life in the service of his country. His name has been added to the growing list of casualties in World War II. The young Marine is the son of Mr. and Mrs. William J. Harding, 25 Clover St., who received a War Department telegram on Wednesday, Aug. 30, stating that their son had been killed in action in the South Pacific war area.

Corporal Harding joined the Marines on Mar. 23, 1942, and went overseas about nineteen months ago. He had participated in the battle of Bougainville and in other major actions in the South Pacific area where the United States Marines have written their heroic deeds indelibly on the pages of American history.

Mr. and Mrs. Harding's last letter from their son was dated July 17.

Corporal Harding was a graduate of St. Francis de Sales School and of De Sales High School. He received his Marine training at Parris Island, N. C.; Quantico, Va., and New River, N. C.

Surviving are his parents, three

sisters, Miss Jane Harding of Geneva, Sgt. Catherine Harding of the United States Marines stationed in Edonton, N. C.; Miss Mary Helen Harding, employed at the United States Ordnance in Martinez, Calif., and one brother, Pvt. First Class John Harding, who is in the South Pacific war zone.

Pvt. First Class Joseph R. Valentino, 21, USMC, of Niagara Falls,

formerly of Geneva, son of Mr. and Mrs. Emanuele Valentino, was killed in action during the performance of his duty in the South Pacific area, according to a War Department telegram received recently by his parents.

The young Marine's grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Rolfo, reside on Reed St., and his fiancée, Miss Phillomena Mazzocchi on North Genesee St.
