Denies Catholics Are Anti-Semitic

BOSTON, Mass. - (RNS) - Claims that Catholics were the source of anti-Semilism were flayed by the Rev. Dr. Arthur J. Riley, librarian at St. John's Seminary in Brighton, Mass, at a two-day conference here on anti-Semitism.

"One of the most important contributions which can be made by this conference," Dr. Riley told his fellow clergymen of various denominations, "is the elimination once and for all in the mind of each one here that the Catholic Church is responsible for modern anti-Semitism."

Father Riley admitted that "there have been grave violations of charity and decency toward Jews on the part of those who by their position and training should have acted differently," but asserted that "it is unfair and dishonest to stig-" matize with approprium any religious group because of the actions of some individuals."

"All of us," he added, "righteous-ly and rightfully condemn such men and such actions, but," he reiterated, "let not our accusations extend to the group of which they were unworthy members."

Father Riley depicted anti-Semitism as another "anti" movement in a "long and ugly series," including anti-Christian, anti-Catholic, anticlerical, anti-Negro, anti-Mexican, anti-capitalistic, and anti-labor, all of which, he declared, exist simultaneously and "with considerable inter-relationship."

The Rev. John S. Sexton, editor of The Pilot, official publication of the Boston archdiocese, voiced the conviction that non-Jews can do the most effective work in dealing with anti-Semitism, and said the best approach "is from the altars of the Christian Church."
