CANADIAN TEACHERS BALK AGAINST BIBLE READING

VANCOUVER, B. C. (RNS)—School trustees of Vancouver face the prospect of personally opening sessions of city schools with readings from the Bible.

Under an amendment to the Schools Act, all sessions must now begin with a daily Bible reading, and if teachers feel it is against their convictions to read the Scriptures, school trustees are held liable to take their places.

Superintendent of Schools H. N. MacCorkindale told the trustees at a recent meeting that "several" teachers had refused to read the Scriptures. He would not reveal the exact number.

Culture Series Opens With Msgr. Sheen Oct. 8

Opening with the eminent Rt. Rev. Msgr. Fulton J. Sheen, the 1944-1945 Christian Culture series will comprise 12 events to include also personages such as Henry C. Wolfe, New York Times correspondent, now in France, and Sister M. Madalena, C.S.C., President of St. Mary's College, Indiana, poet and author.

One lecture-recital by the youthful Austrian composer-philosopher, Arnold Walter, is scheduled. He is now at the Toronto Conservatory of Music in the University of Toronto. Dr. Walter escaped the Nazi terrors on the Isle of Mallorca from which he was rescued by a British Destroyer.

"All the lectures this season will be of the 'popular' type, although substance will not be sacrificed thereby," says the Rev. Hugh Haffey, C.S.B., founder and director of the Christian Culture Series.

"This public lecture series was founded four years ago to provide contact with minds shaping considerable part of the times' thinking. The direction and setting of the series is supplied gratis by the Basilian Fathers who conduct Aquinas Institute. It is offered as a public service to the people of Rochester, Jews, Catholics, Protestants, Europeans and Americans are included among the speakers." Cardinal Van Roey's Archdiocese comprises the provinces of Brabant and Antwerp and Belgium's two largest cities, Brussels and Antwerp.
