**Rites Honor Civic
Leader Geo. Sheahan**

Many Elmiraans mourned the passing of George W. Sheahan, well known political leader and business man in Elmira for many years.

Mr. Sheahan died at his home, 722 East Washington Avenue, on Thursday, Oct. 12. He had been in ill health for about four years and his condition became critical about two weeks ago.

A prominent leader of the Democratic party for almost forty years, Mr. Sheahan was elected alderman of the Sixth Ward for four successive terms prior to the adoption of the City Manager form of government by the city. He was appointed postmaster of the city on February 1, 1934 and served in that capacity until his health forced him to retire in June 1943.

He was born in Elmira in 1876, the son of Mr. and Mrs. John Sheahan and lived almost all of his life in the Sixth Ward. He and a sister, Mrs. Josephine Brooks were the last of the family of eight. When he was about fourteen years of age, he went to work for the H. C. Spaulding Company. Starting as a helper in the mill he was made foreman and later manager and about fifteen years ago was made president of the company, a position which he still held at his death.

Mr. Sheahan was a member of Elmira Council, Knights of Columbus, a member of the Elks Lodge and a former president of the Musicians' Union. One of Elmira's most talented trombone players, he played in the Elks' Band and Haze's Band and was a member of the old Majestic Orchestra for several years.

A Solemn Mass of Requiem was celebrated by the Rev. Arthur C. Smith on Monday morning, Oct. 16, in St. Cecilia's Church, where he had been a communicant since its erection in 1904. Assisting Father Smith, were the Rev. Patrick Connell, Deacon, and the Rev. Phillip McGrath, sub-deacon. Members of the Elmira Mail Carriers Association attended the funeral in full body.

Active bearers were John Diweney, Joseph Crotty, Mortimer Kelly, William Funk and four nephews of Mr. Sheahan, Walter Lawrence and John L. Sheahan and Andrew Brooks. Burial took place in St. Peter and Paul's cemetery where services were conducted by Father Smith and Father Connell.

Besides his wife, Mr. Sheahan is survived by one son, John W. Sheahan, his sister, five grandchildren and several nieces and nephews.


