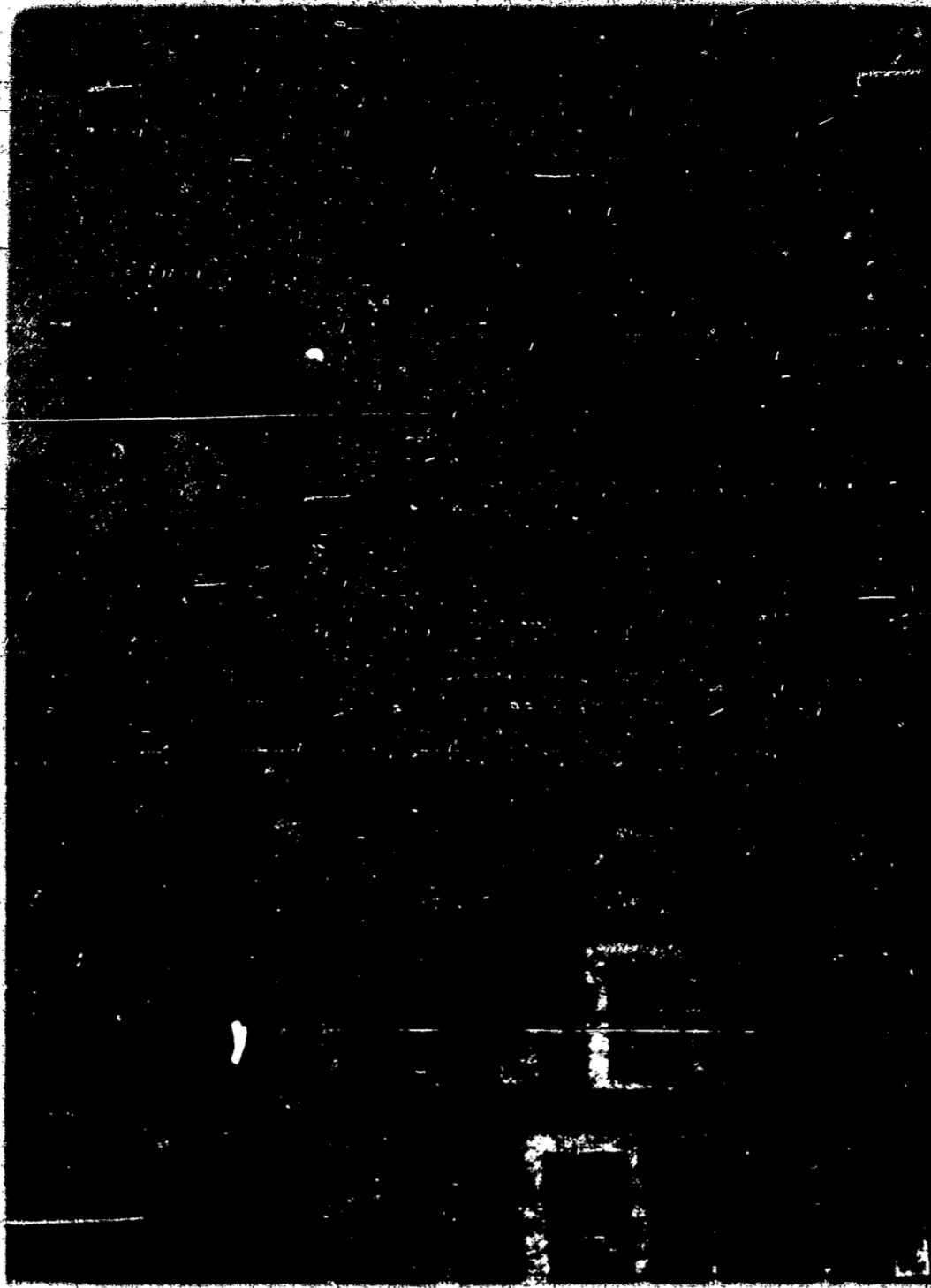

BRITISH PRELATE ADVOCATES HEALTH SCHEME CHANGES

LONDON (RENS) — Amendments to the government's National Health Scheme were urged in a statement here by the Most Rev. Bernard Griffin, Archbishop of Westminster. Clearly directed against birth control, the statement opposed clauses in the scheme which give the Minister of Health power to direct doctors to work in public health centers where "teaching and practices contrary to the teaching of the Church may exist."

Special Tribute Paid Nun At Solemn Mass at Aquinas

At a Solemn High Mass celebrated on last Friday the students and faculty of Aquinas Institute paid their final tribute to Sister M. Clotilde, S.M., who died suddenly during school hours on Nov. 9, at the age of 64.

Rev. William J. Duggan, G.S.B., principal of the school, in his sermon on that occasion, brought out the two principles which were predominant in her character, and they were, first, to live constantly in the state of sanctifying grace, and second, to perform every action for the honor and glory of God.

He told how, after the good sister's death there was found a prayer book of hers, in which was a holy card with these words written on it, "Perform every action as if it was your last on earth." He then urged the student body to take this example of Sister's and put it into their own lives. Sister Clotilde was an instructor of social studies and religion, and had been teaching at the school for twelve years. She took an active interest in all student activities, particularly the athletic program.

Cites Layman's Advantages In Winning Converts

ST. LOUIS, Mo. — How laymen have the advantage over priests in interesting non-Catholics in the Faith is pointed out in the current number of "C.M.O.A." (The Convert Makers of America), which is issued by The Queen's Work Inc., Sedalia central office of the United States and Canada. "The layman that gives instructions," the article amplifies, "has the advantage over the priest in this that the prospective convert may feel more free to ask questions and enter into conversation with a layman than he would with a priest.

"Harsh denunciations and criticisms of Protestants, etc., will do more harm than any sometimes be suspected. Certainly, the errors of Protestants, heretics and schismatics may be and should be pointed out when necessary. But this should always be done in a spirit of charity." The issue also counsels that "Your first convert should be yourself" and "If you get a chance to catch the Apostolic itch, expose yourself and pray that you will keep it for seven times seventy years." The "Convert Makers" is a lay organization recently founded by the Rev. John E. Odor, S. J., of The Queen's Work staff.
