

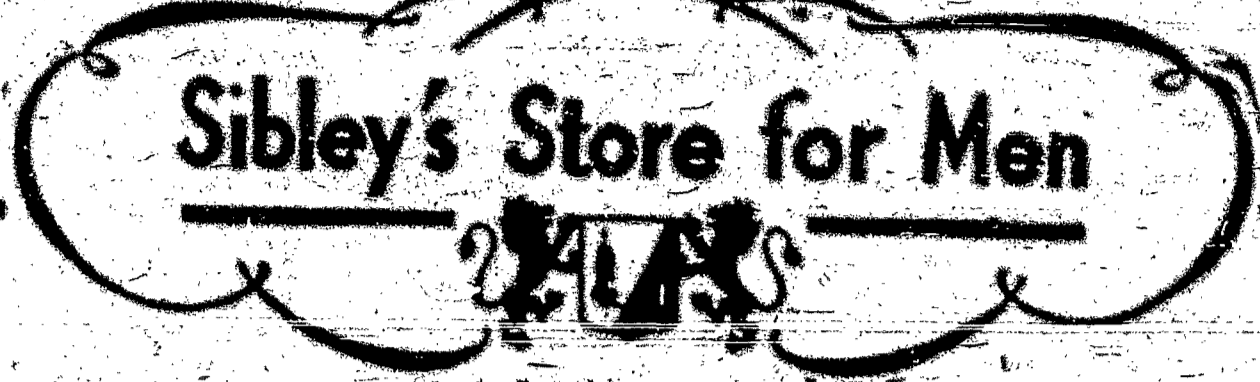
### Military Mass Honors 118 Fordham U. Fallen

NEW YORK — Solemn Military High Mass will be said on Friday, Dec. 15 at 9 A. M. in the Ford-

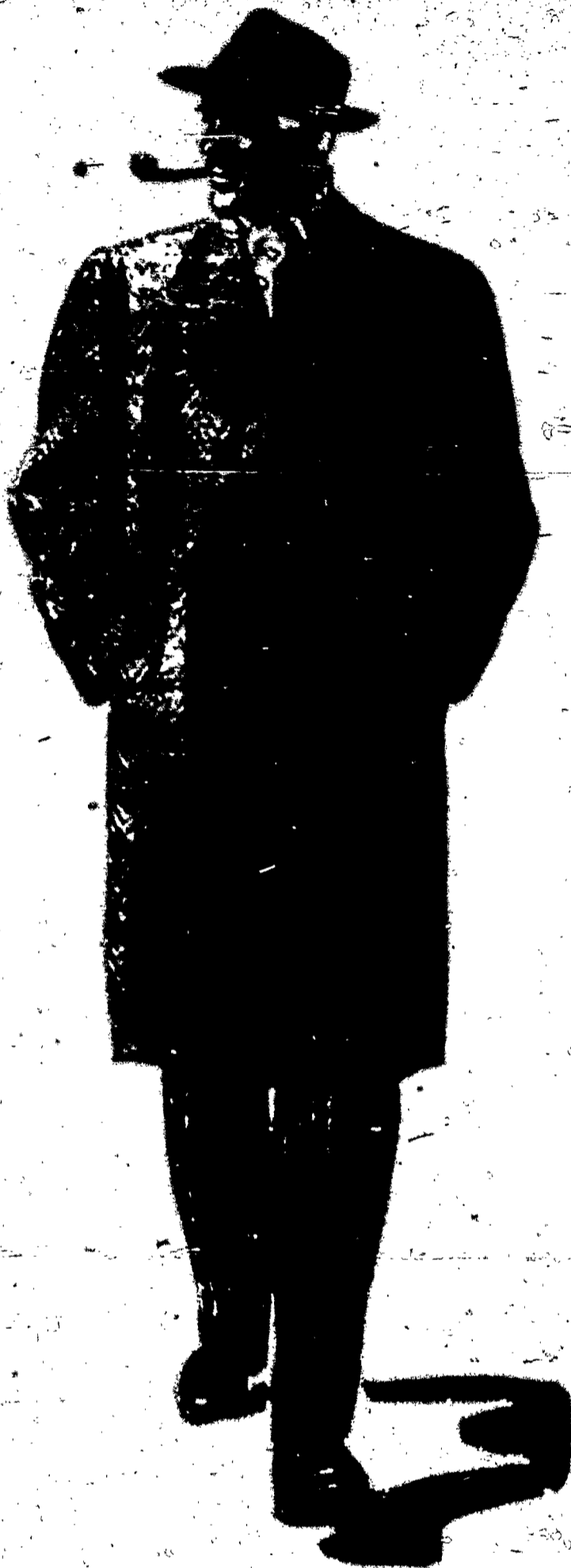
