POLIO DRIVE BROADCAST SET ON WHAM JAN. 13

550 Priests Reported Dead In Concentration Camp

ROME (CIP)—One of the persons who has followed most
closely from Rome the developments in Germany has stated
that the number of German priests who have died in German
concentration camps will be a great surprise after the war. He quoted
one precise figure: From March
1942 to the end of 1944 more than
50 German priests died in Dachau
alone, together with more than 500
Polish priests.

Dachau (near Munich), he said,
is not as bad as the concentra-
tion camp at Oranienburg, near
Berlin nor as the concentra-
tion camp in Poland and Austria. He
added that the Catholic Church
had proved to be the only organiza-
tion in Germany that could escape
the grip of Hitler and could
even outwit the Gestapo as was
proved by the simultaneous read-
ing of Pope Pius XI's anti-racist
encyclical "Mit Brennender Sorge"
in thousands of parish churches
before the Gestapo even knew it
had been issued, printed and dis-
tributed.

There is no doubt that the spiritual
resistance of the Catholics will
be a powerful asset in the recon-
struction of peace, even though
armed revolt against the German
war-lords has not been possible
up to now.
