Dramatic Factual Movies Released for Public View

LOS ANGELES—A movie filmed by the U. S. Navy in zones of combat and intended only for official record, developed such dramatic impact that the Authorities decided to release it to the public through 20th Century-Fox.

Under the title "The Fighting Lady," it emerges in full technicolor and although originally filmed on 16 mm. stock, is of such outstanding photographic quality that it clearly outshines many of the better color features made under peaceful conditions, in the Hollywood studios and locations.

"The Fighting Lady" is the thrilling tale of a U. S. Carrier and the fine fellows whose lives depend upon her armored strength.
