


Seven Give Lives, 8 Wounded

An employee of Thompson United Service Inc. died Aug. 12, 1944. Surviving besides his parents are two sisters, Mrs. Dorothy Kennedy and Mrs. Alice Kennedy Smith, both of the city.

Capt. Edward (Scoopy) Holland, 26, member of the Army Engineers, was killed in Europe, according to word received here by Mr. and Mrs. Jack Male, 222 Driving Park Ave., with whom he lived in Rochester. His father and brother are in Michigan.

Son of Mr. and Mrs. Vincent Ferraro, 385 Parrott Ave., Corp. Ferraro began service in May, 1944, receiving his training at Kester Field, Minn., and Tyndall Field, Fla., where he earned his gunnery wings.

As gunner and assistant radio operator on the B-24, the aircraft with other members of the crew was on a training flight for combat flying from Westover Field, Mass., when the explosion occurred.

Surviving besides his parents are four sisters, Josephine, Margaret and Helene Ferraro and Mrs. Lillian Calabrese.

Second Lt. George E. Gamble Jr., 20, son of Mr. and Mrs. George E. Gamble, 375 Mt. Hope Ave., was killed in action over French Indo-China, according to word received by his parents.

Lieutenant Gamble, pilot of a Mustang fighter, would have received his first Lieutenant's commission this month. He has been awarded the Air Medal posthumously. A letter from his commanding officer states, for the "untold damage" he caused the enemy in his 38 missions. Overseas since May, 1944, he went into service two years ago.

He also leaves four sisters: Mrs. Catherine Reiter, 165 Mages Ave.; Mrs. Mary Mean, 104 Westmoreland Dr.; and the Misses Rita and Patricia Gamble of 375 Mt. Hope Ave.

Pvt. Francis V. Dupre, 18, St. Boniface parishioner, was killed in action in France Dec. 17. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. Frank A. Duane, 44 Broadway, have been informed.

Requiem Mass was offered Thursday, Jan. 4, in St. Boniface Church.

Private Dupre was graduated from Aquinas Institute in 1942, enlisting the following September. He trained at Fort Jackson, S. C., before being sent overseas with the 360th Infantry Division two months ago.

Survivors include three sisters, Mary E. Dupre; Mrs. John J. Prendergast and Mrs. Albert T. Platill, and a brother, Corp. William H. Dupre, serving in Holland with the Medical Corps.

Pvt. Leo W. Carter, 24, husband of Mrs. Jane Carter, 477 Lariviere St., was killed in action on Pacific Nov. 28, the same day that he wrote his mother, Mrs. Marie Carter, 308 Olde St., telling her that he was in good health and asking her not to worry.

A former student at St. Boniface and St. Charles Borromeo Schools, Private Carter went into the Army in September, 1943 and overseas last June. He was employed by James Cunningham Son and Co.

Surviving besides his wife and mother are a 17-month-old daughter, Diane and his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. George Carter of Kings Ferry.

Missing in action since Nov. 28, Pvt. Joseph Ursatto, 20, son of Mr. and Mrs. Casimiro Ursatto, 220 West Elm St., East Rochester, was killed in Germany Nov. 28, a War Department telegram has advised his parents.

Listed missing soon before, in France Aug. 28, Private Ursatto was returned to action Sept. 28, after spending 20 days in a German prison camp before it was captured by his outfit.

Besides his parents, four brothers survive. Pvt. Frank, stationed at Prague, Ind., Mrs. Pvt. Edward McCallister, Als., and Mrs. and Frederick Ursatto, of East Rochester; and three sisters, Miss Lawrence Ferraro and Miss Rosetta Colleone of East Rochester and Mrs. Lucy Ferriani of Rochester. Several Requiem Masses have been offered in St. Jerome's Church, East Rochester.

Requiem Mass was offered Friday, Jan. 5 at Our Lady of Lourdes Church for Pvt. James Connolly, 20, son of Deputy Sheriff and Mrs. James Connolly, 3 Dover St., who was killed in action in France May 12.

Connolly, a native of Ireland, served in the Royal Ulster Constabulary and was
