GENEVA — Memorial Masses for two Geneva soldiers who made the supreme sacrifice in Germany action were offered here last week.

A Memorial Mass for Private William E. Hill of the United States Infantry, who was killed in action in Germany on Nov. 21, was celebrated on Friday, Jan. 5, at 8 o'clock at St. Francis de Sales Church. Rev. Robert Feeney, S.J., Stephen's Church, was celebrant of the Mass and Captain John O'Malley was in charge of the military program.

Private Hill is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Ernest Hill, 18 Park Place. His wife, Mrs. William Hill, resides at 6 Pleasant Street.

Cular bearers were Frank Foley of the Veterans of Foreign Wars and William Van Nortwick of the American Legion. A detachment of Army personnel was also present for the Mass.

A Memorial Mass for Staff Sergeant John M. McGuire, 18, who was killed in action in Germany on Nov. 29, was celebrated on Tuesday, Jan. 2, at 8 o'clock at St. Francis de Sales Church. Staff Sergeant McGuire is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Sherman M. McGuire, 13 Copeland Avenue.

Rev. Raymond P. Nolan, principal of De Sales High School, celebrated the Solemn High Mass with Rev. Robert Feeney as deacon and Rev. William H. McPadden as sub-deacon.

Staff Sergeant McGuire was a graduate of De Sales High School in the class of 1943. Students of the High School were present for the Memorial Mass.
