

Avers Russia Holding Out On Dumbarton Oaks Draft

German Communist... fought with the International Brigade in Spain. The current collaboration with German Generals, Dr. Walsh said, "is at present mainly psy-

chological and propagandistic, but it is extremely doubtful if Weiser and Fleck are waiting their time in purely academic discussions or in Communistic hospitality to the detested invaders and bastards of Stalingrad.

"In view of the precedents now available," Dr. Walsh continued, "the world must not be surprised to see General Von Seiditz and his interned German army follow in the wake of the Russian attack on East Prussia, set up a provisional government in that region — which would promptly be recognized by Moscow as the true Government of Germany — and then proceed to negotiate with the Allies on the basis wholly different from the Roosevelt-Churchill formula of unconditional surrender, a demand which had never been adopted by Soviet Russia.

"This possible eventually become more than a conjecture in the light of the significant statement of Von Seiditz: 'Our intentions are to lead the Wehrmacht to the frontiers of Germany and to preserve it for the people. An honorable peace can be in store only for a people whose Wehrmacht is not disintegrated.' The divisions which he commands can thus be deployed as a political counterweight and in a manner favorable only to the geopolitical program of Russia. Otherwise the sponsorship of this Germanic action in the hole by Russia is without meaning or political purpose — a luxury which Mr. Stalin does not indulgently and which is conspicuously absent from all his recent moves in the still-continuing game of power politics.

Damaged Allied Unity

Contending that Russia in pursuit of her general and special objectives has damaged seriously the cause of Allied unity, Dr. Walsh pointed out the Soviet refusal of the good offices of the United States in the Polish controversy and set up the puppet government at Lublin; refused to participate in the International Conference on Aviation at Chicago after promising to attend; has refused to permit the United Nations Relief and Rehabilitation Administration to distribute relief in the liberated areas under her control; only a few weeks ago summarily expelled four U. S. Representatives of the Office of Strategic Services from Bulgaria; within the last few weeks again has refused to permit U. S. aircraft to use Soviet airfields for shuttle bombing of Germany, and within the last fortnight caused the U. S. State Department and the British Foreign Office to protest vigorously concerning arbitrary confiscation of American and British property in Romania.

"I am informed, moreover," Dr. Walsh disclosed, "that Russia is the one government holding out for a provision in the Dumbarton Oaks draft which would certainly wreck any organization for col-

POLISH QUESTION, PROBLEM IN GREECE DIFFER, DECLARES VATICAN NEWSPAPER

VATICAN CITY (NC) — There are distinct differences between the Polish situation and the Greek situation, Observer *Quotidiano* affirms in a page-one editorial that comments upon various political subjects. The article, devoting several paragraphs to Poland, takes notice of the fact that the British Liberal Party, according to a London report, compared the Polish question to the Greek question.

300 Attending Mass Spared Nazis Foiled Trying To Wipe Out Villages

NEW YORK (NC) — How attendance at Mass foiled a Nazi attempt to wipe out the population of a Belgian village is told by the Rev. John H. Donovan of the Immaculate of Syracuse, on duty as a Chaplain on the Western Front.

"Last Sunday a bomb, one of a constant flow ever here, hit very close while the church was filled with civilians and our soldiers. The children became panicky and started to stampede, but our good, alert GI's took over, restored order and the Mass proceeded. Some plaster fell and there was a rain of glass. It sounded like snow sliding off many roofs. Later we found that many homes had been hit and a few ruined completely. But the casualties were very few — the majority of the people in the area were at the Mass.

An average of 300 Belgian civilians attend daily Mass in the village church, Father Donovan reports. He is stationed at an Army Field Hospital.

Russia still demands the right to vote on any issue involving her own interest, which, obviously would be a vote for herself, though all other governments have agreed to submit such a controversy to an impartial panel and abide by the decision.

Affirming that the Greek question "does not regard territories, the transference of peoples and the dislocation of a nation, but only the regime—the question of political legitimacy," the *Quotidiano* article says:

"For Poland the question is twofold: One of frontiers and one of internal policy. The first one concerns the fate of half the territory of the nation and the displacement of about twelve millions of people. The second is a question of legality, the continuation of legitimacy, ever which the Poles are not divided, ever which they were never at the point of civil war. They never needed to be called on to postpone differences — never present — to the common cause with the Allies, for whom they fought at Warsaw, just as they are fighting on other fronts."

"The question of legitimacy is not like that in Greece, between a legitimate government and another to be set up on a different basis," the article says, "but between a legitimate government and a committee set up without basis and without guarantee."

Continuing, the article refers to the attitude of Russia, stating that "now for all this, it is asked of the power which is in the same relation to the Polish question as England is to Greece, but which cannot say as Churchill said in Athens 'We ask nothing, no territory, no influence.'" "The Polish Government," *Quotidiano* says, "asks of Russia and the Allies to consult all the parties, as in Greece, and not to disturb while the war and the reconstruction of the country require unity of effort, as in Greece, and to advance solutions to the time when the people will be in a position to decide freely, as in Greece. Nothing more — but for Poland it is not the same as for Greece."
