Lieut. Spino who is a member of Delta Theta Phi fraternity graduated from Niagara University in 1942. He joined the Navy in October 1942 and has spent sixteen months on sea duty aboard an LST in the Mediterranean area. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. James Spino, Burt Avenue.


