**Distinguished Flying
Cross, Bronze Star
Won by Corning Men**

CORNING—Bravery and devotion to duty of two Corning servicemen, one a pilot, and the other in the Medical Corps has been recognized by the U. S. Government with awards.

A dispatch from the 10th American Air Force in Italy has recorded that First Lt. John J. Hickey, 22, pilot of a B-17 Flying Fortress, has been awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross "for extraordinary achievement while participating in aerial flight."

Lt. Hickey is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Leroy D. Hickey, 20 W. Fifth St., this city. His wife, the former Miss Marjorie Kelley, and their son, Michael, reside at 178 Bridge St.

On September 21, 1944, the dispatch says, while flying as co-pilot, on a mission over Debrecen, Hungary, his plane was hit by enemy flak, knocking out two of the engines. In spite of this the pilot and Lt. Hickey successfully completed the bomb run.

After being hit it was necessary to take the plane out of formation and fly home unassisted. The two remaining engines developed trouble and it was necessary to throw out all excess weight. As the plane landed at the home base number three propeller with complete nose assembly flew off and took one blade off of number four prop.

Lt. Hickey is also the holder of the Air Medal. He received his pilot's wings on Jan. 7, 1944, at Moody Field, Ga., and went overseas in July, 1944.

Task Sgt. John J. Keane, who is with a Medical Corps of the U. S. Army overseas, has been awarded the Bronze Star for "meritorious service in connection with military operations against the enemy as a medical supply sergeant with an evacuation hospital during the period June 19 to September 22, 1944, in France and Belgium."

The citation which accompanied the decoration has been received by his mother, Mrs. John J. Keane, 200 Parkside Ave. It is signed by Lt. General Courtney H. Hodges and reads:

"Task Sgt. Keane maintained an ample stock of medical supplies and equipment sufficient for prompt and adequate care of the wounded at all times. During the period when the number of patients far exceeded the hospital capacity, he performed his duties with utter disregard for personal fatigue, thereby contributing materially to the successful operations of his organization."

Sgt. Keane was employed in the Purchasing Department of Corning Glass Works before entering the service in October, 1942.
