

11 Catholic Boys Die, 12 Are Hurt in War, 4 Held by Foe

The war casualties for the week totaled eleven dead, twelve wounded, and four prisoners. Three Catholic men are hospitalized overseas and one is now safe, after being listed missing in action.

Pvt. Charles Andrews, 25, son of Mr. and Mrs. George Andrews, 112 Madison St., was killed in action Dec. 4 in Germany, according to word received by his parents. Requiem Mass was offered at St. Joseph's Church, Tuesday, Feb. 6.

Twice reported missing in action, Private Andrews went overseas in June, 1944, serving in France and Germany. Surviving besides his parents are two brothers, Pts. Michael Andrews, serving in France, and Stephen of Rochester; three sisters, Mrs. Stephen Ederation, Mrs. Donald Wilmont and Nellie Andrews.

Pvt. Leo T. Bernal, 24, son of Mrs. Bernal, 65 Elmwood St., was killed in action Dec. 21, in Germany. His mother has been informed. Requiem Mass will be offered Saturday, Feb. 20, in the Church of Our Mother of Sorrows at 3 A. M.

Private Bernal was a member of Our Mother of Sorrows Church at the time he entered service February, 1944. Overseas since last summer, he was wounded Oct. 2 in Germany and returned to action.

A brother, Corp. George Bernal, member of a Signal Corps unit in Europe, also survives.

Mrs. Marianna DiLeo, 64 Hand St., Rochester, Mass. will be offered Requiem Mass at 8:30 a. m. in St. Bridget's Church.

Overseas since December, 1942, Private DiLeo had been seriously wounded in France last June. He entered service in April, 1942. Other survivors are several aunts and uncles in Cleveland.

Member of an armored infantry unit, Pvt. Peter A. Manfredi, 20, was killed in action Dec. 21 in Belgium. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. Nicholas Manfredi, 205 First St., have learned.

Requiem Mass was offered Wednesday, Jan. 21, in St. Xavier Church.

Private Manfredi trained with an anti-aircraft unit after he entered service in February, 1942. He went overseas last September. Surviving, besides his parents are three brothers, S/Mgt. Romeo A. Manfredi, in France; Corp. Benjamin in Italy, and William in Rochester; six sisters, Mrs. Victor Le Tompse, Mrs. Charles Aloni, Mrs. Samuel Chastra, and the Misses Mary, Victoria and Jennette Manfredi, and a grandfather, Romeo Manfredi.

Pts. William O'Brien, 18, son of Mrs. Ruth O'Brien, 69 Keegan St., Rochester, died Jan. 21, 1945, in a Luxembourg hospital of wounds received Jan. 6 in action. His mother learned this week. Mass and funeral services were conducted in the Church of the Nativity of the Blessed Virgin Mary Tuesday, Feb. 6.

Private O'Brien had been overseas less than four months when he was wounded for the first time, Nov. 4, and awarded the Purple Heart. A graduate of the School of the Holy Child, he attended Rochester High School before his induction Dec. 1, 1942.

Besides his mother, he leaves his father, Lawrence; Frances, Mary, Arden, Florence O'Brien and two brothers, Pvt. Leo O'Brien, serving with an anti-aircraft unit in Belgium, and Donald O'Brien.

Pts. Vincent J. Oshelovick, 18-year-old son of Mrs. Alice Oshelovick, was killed in action in Belgium Jan. 7, his sister, Miss Genevieve Oshelovick, has been injured. The family resides at 370 Weaver St.

Requiem High Mass was offered by St. Stanislaus Church Tuesday, Jan. 23.

A member of the 6888 Central Postal Directory, Private Oshelovick entered service April 2, 1942 and had been overseas in France since going overseas in January, 1942.





Requiem Mass was offered in St. Peter and Paul's Church Monday, Feb. 6, 1945.


Member of an armored division, Private Schied had been in service since January, 1944 and overseas since October. He attended St. Peter and Paul's School.
