4 Die, 9 Wounded in War Areas

Parish reports for the week list four diocesan men killed on the various battlefronts, nine wounded in action and two interned by the enemy. Five others are now in safety after being reported missing.

Sgt. John J. Brosky, 22, machine-gunner with the Infantry, was killed in action Dec. 3, 1944, in Germany, his parents, Mr. and Mrs. John Brosky, 1117 Clinton Ave. N., have learned.

Requiem Mass was offered in the Church of Our Lady of Perpetual Help Wednesday, Feb. 14, 1945.

A former member of Cross Brothers, Sergeant Brosky enlisted Dec. 12, 1943 and went overseas last Sept. 18. Surviving besides his parents is a grandmother, Mrs. Anna Brosky.

Pfc. William C. Kulaga, 19-year-old machine-gunner, was killed in action in Alsace-Lorraine Jan. 1, the War Department has informed his mother, Mrs. Mary Kulaga, 224 Rauber St.

Requiem High Mass will be offered Saturday, Feb. 24, at 8 a. m. in St. Theresa's Church.

Private Kulaga entered service a year ago and went overseas last December 23. Surviving besides his mother, are an aunt and uncle, Mr. and Mrs. James Sabor and several cousins.

Pfc. George E. Lewis of St. Michael's, Lyons, was killed in action in the Philippines Dec. 11, shortly before his 21st birthday, according to word reaching the parents, Mr. and Mrs. George Lewis, 2 Canal St., Lyons.

Requiem Mass will be celebrated Monday, Feb. 19, in St. Michael's Church.

Private Lewis, familiarly known as "By," entered service in March, 1942 and went overseas in March, 1944. He saw action with the Infantry on Guam before going into the Philippines.

Pvt. Leo W. Pilon, 27, whose brother, George Pilon, resides at 741 Joseph Ave., was killed in infantry action Jan. 18 in France. Requiem Mass was offered in St. John the Evangelist Church, Green.

Formerly a paratrooper, Private Pilon had been in service since December, 1943. He studied at St. Andrew's School.

Besides his brother, four sisters survive: Mrs. Doris Fox, 179 Ridgeway Rd., with whom he used to live; Florence Monk; Lorraine Sherman and Mary Murray.

Pvt. Joseph E. Givro, 27, 11, glider infantryman was wounded in action Jan. 5 in Belgium, his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Givro, 578 Scio St., have been informed.

A member of Our Lady of Mount Carmel parish, Private Givro went into service in June, 1943, and has been overseas since November, of that year.

Word has been received here that Pfc. Kenneth Clark, 31-year-

old son of Mrs. Florence Clark, 187 University Ave., and former parishioner of St. Mary's Church, was wounded in action Jan. 23 in France. He is hospitalized overseas for knee injuries.

Private Clark, whose wife, Mrs. Angela Clark and 7-month-old son live in Iowa, entered service in April, 1942 and went overseas last December. He attended St. Mary's School and Aquinas Institute.

Sgt. Robert D. Foley, 26, Sacred Heart parish, was slightly wounded Jan. 19 in Belgium, his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Daniel T. Foley, 184 Lapham St., have learned.

A graduate of Aquinas Institute, Sergeant Foley went into service two months after leaving school and studied under AGIF at Cornell University before being assigned to the Infantry. He went overseas this past October as an automatic rifleman.

Wounded in action Dec. 17 in Luxembourg, Pvt. Joseph E. La-

mas, 21, son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank LaMas, 37 Weld St., has been awarded the Purple Heart in a hospital in France.

Private LaMas was a member of Our Lady of Mount Carmel Church when he entered the Army in March, 1944. He has been overseas since last November.

Former city playground director, Capt. Robert McCall, 19, suffered shrapnel wounds in action last month in Luxembourg, his parents, Mr. and Mrs. James McCall, 280 South Ave., have learned. He has received the Purple Heart.

A former pupil of St. Mary's School, Corporal McCall went into service in November, 1943 and went overseas 11 months later.

Pfc. Alton (Bud) Moore, 21, was wounded in action in France, Dec. 18. The son of Mr. and Mrs. Alton Moore, 284 Post Ave., Private Moore graduated from Aquinas Institute before going into service. He was called to duty in June, 1943, while he was in the Army Reserve at Niagara University and went overseas this fall.

Pfc. George H. Railton, 24, son of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Railton, 300 Linden Rd., and husband of Williamina Black Railton, 300 Hayward Ave., has been returned to active duty after being wounded on Leyte Nov. 6, the family has learned.

A former pupil of Corpus Christi School, Private Railton entered service Oct. 17, 1942 and went overseas in July, 1944.

Pvt. Edward J. Soule, 19, son of Joseph Soule, 58 Ontario St., was wounded in action Jan. 4 in Belgium, according to word received by the father.

Listed missing since Sept. 8, Pfc. L. Raymond H. Brough, 22, of Immaculate Conception parish, is a prisoner of the German government his wife, Mrs. June Brough, 100 Pleasant Ave., Ft. Pleasant, has been informed.
