Sailors Give Bursar To Bishop in Hawaii

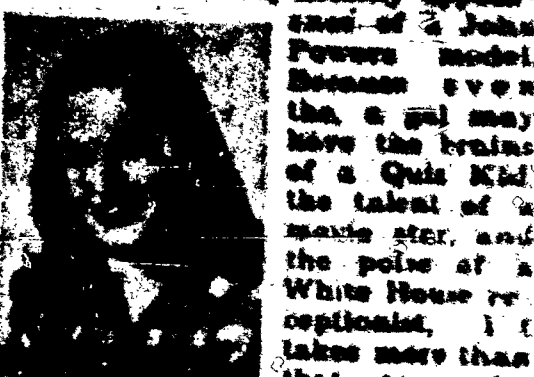
