Word has been received here that Private Alfred K. Grecian, of Holy Apostles parish, 36, son of Mr. and Mrs. Samuel Grecian, 78 Sterling St., was wounded in action with his field artillery in France last December. He was awarded the Purple Heart.

Pvt. Frank J. Pandolino, 29, son of Sam Pandolino, 172 Atkinson St., and a member of Our Lady of Mt. Carmel Church, was wounded Jan. 21 in Luxembourg according to word reaching his wife, Mrs. Adeline Pandolino, who resides with their two-year-old daughter Judith at 625 Erie St. Two brothers, Charles and Anthony are in service.

Rgt. Jerome C. Haas, 36, a glider infantryman, was slightly wounded Dec. 21 in action in Belgium, his father, George Haas, 114 Elm St., is informed. A former pupil of St. Joseph's and St. John the Evangelist schools, Sergeant Haas entered service in 1942 and has been overseas since February, 1944.

Pvt. Vincent M. Keen, 21, son of Mr. and Mrs. Vincent Keen, 544 Joseph Ave., and husband of Mrs. Elizabeth Collins Keen, 11 Meyer Pl., suffered shell wounds in action Jan. 19 in Belgium. He is recovering in an overseas hospital. A graduate of St. Boniface School, he entered service in May, 1944 while a member of St. Boniface parish.

Pvt. Frank C. Kowalewski, whose brother is a privateer of the Germans, was wounded in infantry action Dec. 31 in Oberberg, France, his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Walter Kowalewski, 120 Dodge St., have learned. His brother, S/Sgt. Stanley J. Kowalewski, was captured after an air raid in which he participated as nose-gunner on a B-24 over Austria last June. Private Frank was stationed in the Alentians for more than two years where he received the Purple Heart medal for an injury which was not caused by enemy action. He is a member of Holy Apostles Church.

Pvt. Joseph Koss of St. Monica's parish, 28, is recovering in a hospital in England from wounds received Jan. 12 in Belgium. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Koss, 265 Raylyn St., were advised. A graduate of Aquinas Institute, he was studying at Niagara University at the time he enlisted in November, 1944. He was sent overseas in September, 1943 following training under ASTP at Virginia Polytechnic Institute.

Pvt. Robert G. Lanning, 30, member of St. Phillip's Church, was wounded in action Jan. 20 while serving with an infantry unit in Belgium. Son of Mrs. E. Lanning, 27 Kester St., Private Lanning entered service in June, 1944 and has been overseas since December. A former pupil of St. Francis Xavier School, he has a brother, Tech. Sgt. Bernard Lanning, who has served 27 months overseas.

Lt. Kenneth E. Murray of Holy Apostles parish was seriously wounded in infantry action on Leyte Nov. 24 and has received the Purple Heart; his wife, Mrs. Elizabeth Murray, 231 Erie St., was notified. Lt. Murray went into service in March, 1942. Overseas more than a year, he has a son, David Kenneth, whom he has never seen. A brother, Corporal Jack W. Murray, is a radio gunner with the AAF. They are sons of Mr. and Mrs. William K. Murray, 300 Erie St. Two brothers, Charles and Anthony are in service.

Stolzene suffered serious injuries in action Jan. 30 in France, according to word reaching his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Schleifer, 379 Champlain St. An infantryman, Private Stolzene began service in August, 1944 and has been overseas since January. A former pupil of St. Peter and Paul's School and Aquinas Institute, he has two brothers in service, Sgt. Joseph and S/Sgt. George Stolzene.

Pvt. Eugene W. Tracy of St. Agnes' parish was wounded in action Feb. 5 in France, his parents, Mr. and Mrs. William Tracy Jr., 121 Avondale Rd., have learned. Member of the 18th Infantry, Seventh Army, the 28-year-old soldier went overseas in October, 1944 following disbanding of his ASTP course in engineering. He graduated from Aquinas Institute and studied at St. Michael's College in Toronto until he went into service in November, 1942.

Corporal Samuel J. Amico, son of Mr. and Mrs. Paul Amico, 301 First St., is listed missing in action since Dec. 12, the date of his 24th birthday. His wife, Mrs. Josephine Amico of Mt. Morris has learned. A member of the Medical Corps, the corporal entered service two years ago and has been overseas 14 months. He holds a Presidential citation.

T/Sgt. Joseph G. Stahl, 26, half-track driver in a Seventh Army armored division, has been reported

missing in action in France since Jan. 1, his wife, Mrs. Lucille Depp, 61 Harrison St., is informed. Son of Mrs. Bertha Depp and Lucy Ave., and Joseph Depp, 265 Remington St., he began service in December, 1942 and went overseas last September. He is a former pupil of Holy Apostles.

Sgt. R. Frank O'Conor, 22, St. Charles parish has been missing in action in France since Jan. 6, according to word received by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Samuel P. O'Conor, 99 Highland Rd. The 20-year-old infantryman entered service in September, 1942 and has been overseas since November, 1944.

Previously listed missing in action over Germany, Staff Sgt. William A. Stark, 24, son of Mr. and Mrs. William L. Stark, 50 Sycamore Ter., is now reported a prisoner of the Germans. Sergeant Stark was a member of St. Ambrose Church when he entered service in April, 1942. He has been overseas since last September.

Pvt. Michael J. Sollard, 19-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Sam Sollard, 31 Hand St., is a prisoner of the Germans, according to information coming through the International Red Cross. Private Sollard was listed missing in action in France since Sept. 12. A member of St. Bridget's parish, he entered service in February, 1943 and has been overseas since October, 1943. He has a brother, Pvt. Philip Sollard, stationed in Oklahoma. Their father, a veteran of World War I, also served in France.

A Solemn Memorial Mass for Pfc. Joseph G. Welder, 20, son of Mr. and Mrs. Lawrence A. Welder, 125 Westfall Road, was offered Monday, Feb. 5, in St. Ann's Church.

Private Welder was killed in action in Belgium Jan. 7. A graduate of St. Joseph's School and former student at Aquinas Institute, he was associated with his father in a plumbing and heating concern in Clinton Ave. South before entering the service in April, 1944. He was overseas with an infantry glider unit since last August.

The Rev. George J. Schmidt offered the Mass of the day—in honor of St. Agatha, virgin and martyr—assisted by the Rev. John Merklinger as deacon and the Rev. William Willensmen, S.C.C., of Our Lady of Victory Church as sub-deacon. In the sanctuary were the Rev. Stephen Aufbach, C.S.B., R. pastor of St. Joseph's Church, and the Rev. William Dougherty, C.S.B., R. also of St. Joseph's.

Besides his parents, Private Welder is survived by his grandmother, Mrs. Mary B. Welder; two sisters, Mrs. Edward Brennan and Sister Mary Timothy of the Sisters of Mercy; three brothers, Louis W., Richard L. and Lawrence A. Welder Jr., and several nieces and nephews.
