Six Give Lives in War, Six Wounded

Diocesan war casualties totaled six killed, six wounded and two missing in action, according to reports received here this week. Two Catholic men, formerly listed missing, have been taken prisoners and a third is now reported safe.

Wounded in action in Burma Jan. 27, Tom, 2d Lt. George Diament, 21, of St. Jerome's parish, East Rochester, died Feb. 21 in Agra, India.

Son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Diament, of East Rochester, the infantryman, is the second member of the family to give his life. A cousin, Pvt. Leo Diament, died in battle last December in Belgium.

Corporal Diament, was holder of the Purple Heart for previous injuries in Burma, the Combat Infantryman's Badge and a Presidential Unit Citation. He entered service two years ago.

Surviving besides his parents are three brothers, Romeo, Jasper and Lima Diament, who has an honorable service discharge.

Requiem Funeral Mass for Pte. James T. Grieve, 26, son of Mrs. Alexander Grieve, who was killed in action on Jan. 20, was offered in St. Mary's Church, Canandaigua, Tuesday, Feb. 27, 1945.

A former taxicab operator, Private Grieve was inducted in December, 1942, and went overseas four months later. He fought with the 189th Infantry Regiment in New Georgia and served at Guadalcanal, Rendova, New Caledonia and the Russell Islands before the invasion of the Philippines.

Other survivors are three brothers, George of Holden, Alexander of Rochester and Robert of Canandaigua, and three sisters, Mrs. Henry Haight, Helen and Isobel Grieve, all of Canandaigua.

Previously informed that one son was missing in action, Mrs. Mary Morabito, 31 West Ave., Spencerport, has received a War Department communication stating another son, Pte. Frank Morabito, dead of wounds received Feb. 20 in France.

The missing son is Pte. Anthony Morabito, who was with an infantry unit in Germany when he was reported lost.

Private Frank, also an infantryman, had been overseas since November, 1944. He worked at Haloid Company before entering service in May, 1944.

Besides his mother, he leaves three brothers, Pte. Joseph, 22, in the Pacific theater; Lt. Arthur, 24, at Santa Maria Field, Calif., and Angelo Morabito, at home, also a sister, Helen Morabito.

Pte. Kenneth P. O'Brien, husband of Mrs. Anne O'Brien, 315 Belmont St., was killed in action with a First Army Infantry Unit, Nov. 4 in Germany, his wife has learned. A graduate of St. Mary's Academy, Little Falls, N. Y., Private O'Brien came to Rochester six weeks before his induction into service in June, 1944. He went overseas in July, 1944.

In addition, he is survived by his mother, Mrs. Anna O'Brien,

Son of Mrs. Irene LaPierre, 31 Clement St., Private Sexton had been serving at Newark, N.J., and New Haven, Conn., before overseas assignment in March, 1944, and joined the 120th Infantry of the National Guard in September, 1944.

Besides his mother, he leaves a brother, Martin, 22, Belmont, N.Y.; a sister, Mrs. Howard Tracy, and a brother, Mrs. Howard Tracy.

Corporal Alwyn H. Gohl, 23, year-old Liberator radio gunner, son of Mr. and Mrs. Philip J. Gohl, 313 Clifford Ave., has been missing over Yugoslavia since Feb. 18, according to word reaching the parents. Before going into service in February, 1942, Corporal Gohl attended St. Mary's College, North East, Pa., and was admitted to Seminary. He was
