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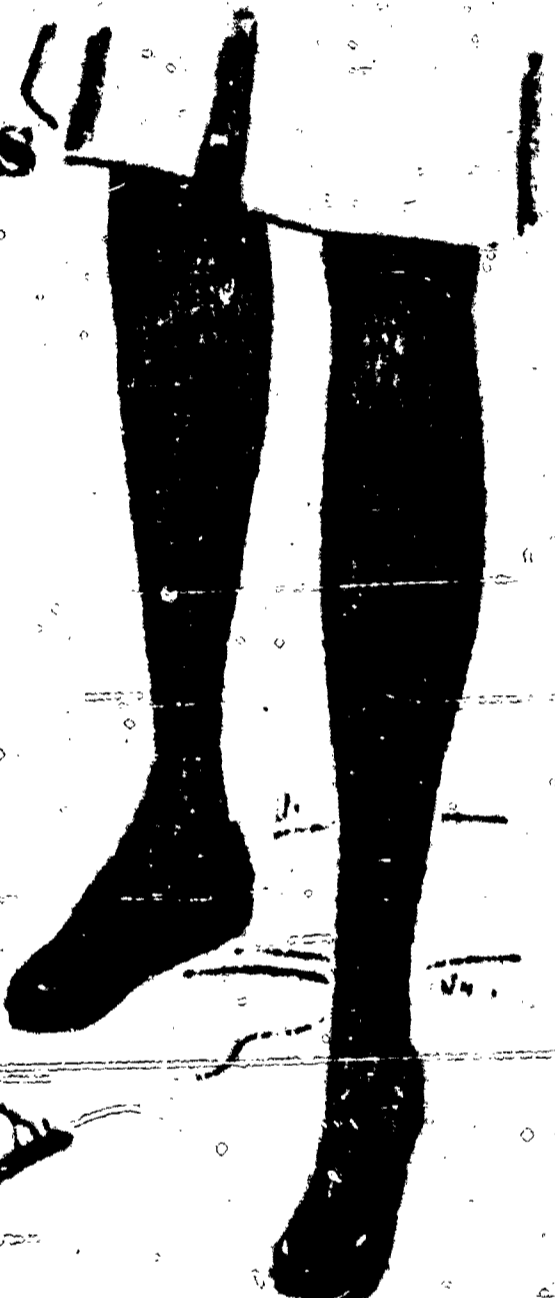
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The NCCS Canteen Review

Walloping The Pacific
We had an interesting talk about unusual conditions with a sailor who returned in January from seventeen months overseas. Fifteen of them spent on an island two miles from the equator. Until the capture of Leyte, their island was behind the Jap forces, hundreds of miles ahead of our ships. Although under frequent shellfire, their most bothersome enemy was the hot and humid climate, with temperature averaging between 150° and 160°.

The sailor was a resident of Chicago, where he was a watchmaker employed on very fine, skilled work by the Elgin Watch Company. The Navy needed just such a man for a watchmaker by delicate navigation instruments, broken in battle areas; hence, three weeks after entering the Navy, the former watchmaker shipped out for tropical climates as a seaman second class, without customary boat training, with no idea of military life.

For fifteen months he did this tedious, delicate repair work, for fifteen or sixteen hours a day, under constant strain from surrounding battle and unhealthful living conditions. Hospitalized in Okinawa, Okla. in January, he was sent from there to the Sampson hospital. Last week-end was his first leave since he landed on that un-named island, twenty months ago. He still hasn't been home to see his family, and is waiting patiently for Navy orders. After all this time, he says with a resigned air, he can wait a little longer.

Next week the Canteen celebrates another birthday (its own! The Canteen will have reached the ripe old age of one year, next Sunday, and will celebrate in fitting manner. The staff would like to express its appreciation to the groups which have made this venture the great success it has become: the volunteer groups which have taken over the running of the Canteen for a Sunday
