Baptist Pastor Defends Taylor in Vatican Post; Lauds Catholic World Role

RALEIGH, N. C. (RNS)—Myron Taylor's presence at the Vatican as President Roosevelt's personal representative was defended here by Dr. Broadus Jones, pastor of the First Baptist Church, in a sermon discussing "Contributions the Catholics Have Made to Religion."

Dr. Jones asserted that the Catholic Church "has played and will always play an important role in European affairs."

"Since the Pope must be statesman as well as religious leader," he declared, "it is important to our country to be in close touch with every influence or force which will help to reshape Europe, in which we, too, have a central interest and destiny."

Among the greatest achievements of the Catholics, the Baptist minister asserted, was the preservation

Mrs. John Barry and Miss Marian Leahy have been engaged by the Zoology department of Nazareth College as instructors in Veteran Rehabilitation and Mental Hygiene.

Mrs. Barry was graduated from Nazareth College in 1933 and received her Master's degree from Smith College in 1936. After graduating, she joined the staff of Central Islip State Hospital as a psychiatric social worker, and she is now employed by the Rochester Chapter of the Red Cross. She was also affiliated with the Army Emergency Relief in New York City. Her job is to act as a channel through which the doctors in the Armed Forces can secure the necessary background information to help combat the physical and mental diseases of Service men. The Red Cross also follows the veteran after his discharge from military life, and helps him toward readjustment.

Miss Leahy, also a graduate of Nazareth College, received her Master's degree from the Fordham School of Social Service. She is Liaison Supervisor at the Rochester Department of Public Welfare, and is a member of the American Association of Social Welfare Workers. She represents the Department on the Legislative Committee of the Council of Social Agencies and is also a member of the Association's Legislative Committee.

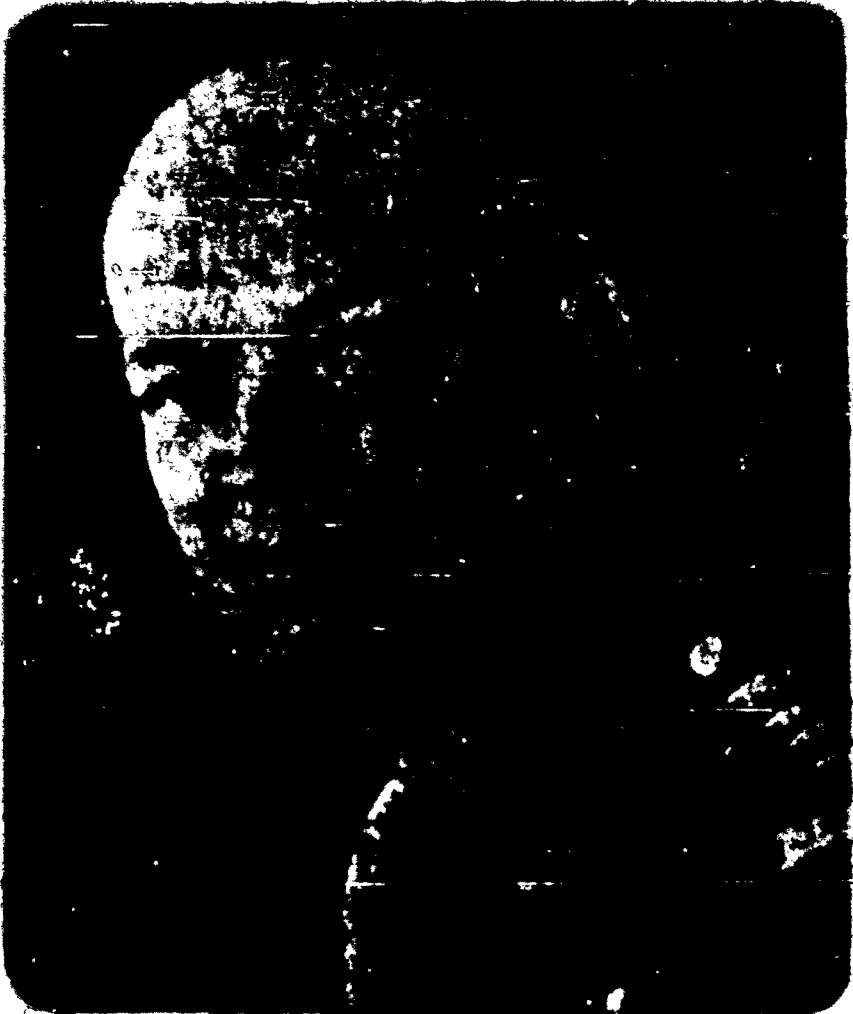
ing in the heavy monasteries of Europe.
Discussing the spirit of vengeance which he said has traditionally motivated the Catholic Church, Dr. Jones reminded his congregation that the Roman Church spread Christianity throughout Europe, and by so doing "also took the lessons of science and culture into

a region but recently overrun by barbaric hordes."
Another Catholic contribution, he added, was its world-wide view and approach to problems. He explained that Catholics take no racial or geographical view of their problems, and that the Church draws no distinctions between local, state, and foreign missions.
