

## Nazareth Participates in Interracial Justice Week

During National Interracial Justice Week, March 4-11, more than 80,000 Catholic College Students from 103 institutions all over the country have been participating in ac-

tivities that deal not only with the cultural aspects of the question, but with the historical and sociological aspects as well.

Their aim is to stimulate an active awareness of the civil obligation to human liberty, equality, and justice for all men in this country, since it is for these very principles that we are engaged in this world conflict. Opening Panel Discussion in the East was inaugurated at Manhattanville on Saturday, March 4. The Panel centered around three phases of the problem which are national in scope and which are being legislated in Congress at the present time.

Speakers were Ray Withins, editor of "The Crisis" and acting secretary of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People; Dr. Nathan J. Oliver, former president of the Catholic Interracial Council; Miss Margaret McCormack, editor of the Youth column of the "Inter-racial Review" and Secretary-Treasurer of the Alumni Race Relations Council; and George K. Munson, Executive Secretary of Catholic Interracial Council since 1941 and editor of "Inter-racial Review."

Miss Barbara Manning Murphy, head of the Interracial Commission at Manhattanville, acted as chairman.

On Feb. 21, the Rev. John Fogarty addressed members of the Society Club of Manhattan College on the "Negro Question." Rev. Fogarty is the chairman of the Rochester Branch of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People. He also introduced by Rev. James J. Allen, professor of Theology at Manhattanville.

Rev. Fogarty stated that the Negro

question was a series of paradoxes, and that it was entirely inconsistent with the idea of independence. At present, the Negro is concerned with a positive program of action. His immediate needs are: an elementary justice for all people and an opportunity to work without discrimination. He said that education, both for the Negro and for the white man, will be an important factor in overcoming the race question. Rev. Fogarty's address was followed by a question period in which much lively interest was shown by the students.

## Contraception Will Down Britain, Not Nazis, Warns Doctor

LONDON (NO) — "It is not the Nazis but the practice of contraception that will bring the downfall of England," warned Haldimand, well-known Catholic doctor-author, in a lecture at Bolton, Lancashire.

"We are already losing our effective population," he said. Every year for the past 20 years our school population has been progressively declining. In 1920 we were losing school children at the rate of 100,000 a year. The average family has declined from seven in 1850 to one in 1931 and at the next census it may be found that the average family has no child at all.

## Fr. Wheaton Sworn Into Regular Navy

Lt. Commander John K. Wheaton, United States Navy Chaplain from the Diocese of Rochester, was sworn in as a member of the regular Navy at his post in the North African area, it has been learned here.

In changing from the United States Naval Reserve (USNR) to the regular United States Navy (USN), Father Wheaton retains his present rank of Lieutenant Commander.

He was commissioned a Lieutenant in the Navy, November 2, 1941. He served as Chaplain aboard the USS Helena when that ship was sunk by enemy fire in the Battle of Kula Gulf in the summer of 1942. Following this action, Chaplain Wheaton was awarded the Purple Heart and subsequently promoted to the rank of Lieutenant Commander.
