## 5 Soldiers Give Lives; 14 Wounded

Five Catholic servicemen died in action, fourteen suffered wounds and one is a prisoner who was released by the Russians.

Pfc. Joseph A. Crotelli, 26, son of Mr. and Mrs. Peter Crotelli, 274 Wilson Ave., Newark, was killed in action Jan. 24, in Germany, according to word received by his wife, Mrs. Carmela Crotelli of Newark.

Inducted Mar. 26, 1944, Private

Crotelli went overseas last November and was believed to have gone into action

only four days before his death.

Surviving besides his wife and parents are a 6-year-old daughter, Patricia; one sister, Mrs. Michael Andrews and two brothers, Frank, of Buffalo, Sgt. Michael Crotelli in the Philippines, and A/C Michael Crotelli, Alton, Ill.

DiAntonio, 27, infantryman, who

was killed in action Feb. 8, in Ger-

many, was offered in Holy Fa-

mily Church Tuesday, Feb. 21, 1945.

went into service in January, 1941.

He went overseas with an infantry

unit last December.

He was a former pupil of Holy Cross School

and Aquinas Institute.

Otis; four sisters, Margaret, Rose

and Jean of this city and Mrs.

David Niedemayr of East Roches-

mond C. Gardner, 24, son of Mr.

and Mrs. Raymond Gardner, of

Spencerville, who

was killed in action Dec. 27, in

Germany, was offered in St.

John the Evangelist Churc-

h, Spencerville, on Tues-

day, Mar. 12, 1945.

In service since June, 1940, Cor-

poral Gardner had 24 months

duty with a field artillery unit in Puerto Rico be-

fore going overseas in September,

1944.

Two brothers are in service: H.

J. Gardner, Pacific Coas-

ter, and Sgt. William Gardner,

as a recent medical discharge.

Pvt. Howard J. Schott, Jr., of St.

John's Parish, 26-year-old son of

Mr. and Mrs. H. J. Schott, 704

Howard St., was killed in action

in Germany Dec. 21, the same day

he was listed missing, the par-

ents are informed.

Private Schott entered service in

December, 1943, and was assigned

to the AT&T course at Al-

laman Polytechnic, H. J. Schott, Jr.

Institute. Transferred to the in-

fantry after the conclusion of this

course, the radio operator went

overseas last October.

Besides his parents, he leaves

a grandmother, Mrs. Leah Roun-

ing, 86, Webster, Rochester,

and two brothers, Charles Lewis

and John Schott, of Rochester.
