AUBURN — One Catholic soldier from here is reported as missing in action in France while five other servicemen have been wounded, the war casualty reports of the week reveal.

Pvt. Robert H. Kuhn, 20, son of Mrs. Bruno Kuhn, 300 Haycock Dr., and husband of Mrs. Arline Eileen Kuhn, Bay Road, Webster, has been reported wounded in action Feb. 11 in Germany. Father of 6-year-old Norman and 4-year-old Paul Kuhn, Private Kuhn entered service a year ago, going overseas with an infantry unit Jan. 1, January.

One of four brothers in service, of Our Lady of Mt. Carmel parish, Pte. Nicholas Lodiato, 20, son of Louis Lodiato, 135 Delavan St., suffered slight wounds in France Jan. 29; his father has learned. Private Lodiato entered service in January, 1942, and went overseas the following August. His three brothers are: Francis, 12, Army; Louis, Pacific theater; Andrew, 2½; Joseph Lodiato, also in the Pacific; and Roman, 1½; James Lodiato, Newport, R. I.

Corporal Donald F. Miller, a member of Blessed Sacrament Church, was slightly wounded Feb. 11 in action over Germany, according to wire received by his wife, Geraldine Miller, 86 Belmont St., Son of Mr. and Mrs. Elmer Miller, 84 Belmont St., the Radio Technician entered service in January, 1942, and has been overseas more than two years. He has a son, Ronald, 2.

Wounded in action Dec. 12 in France, Pvt. Mario Esco, 21, son of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Esco, 230 Davis St., is now back on active duty, according to recent word. In service since May, 1943, he went overseas in August, 1943, and saw 16 months service in Italy with a field artillery unit before going to France. Pvt. Robert Borch, 18-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Victor Borch, 21 David St., is a prisoner of the German government, his parents have learned. A member of Our Lady of Mt. Carmel Church, Private Borch joined the U. S. Army Infantry in June, 1943. Overseas since September, 1944, he was reported missing in action on Oct. 31.

Bill Would Raise Savings Insurance

A bill to increase to \$100 the amount of Savings Bond Life insurance which New York people may buy has been introduced in the State Legislature by Senator Henry W. Williamson and Assemblymen Harry A. Rosen, Harry W. Prentiss, Chairman of the Savings Bonds Life Insurance Fund committee.

"This amendment to the Savings Bond Life Insurance Law is needed," said Mr. Prentiss. "It will result in a further incentive to the sale of savings bonds to our military manpower buyers."

"Although Savings Bond Life Insurance bonds are currently approximately 100 times their face value of patriotic bonds by the ordinary companies, and up to 1000 times certain types of specialty premium policies, costs can be lowered still further if larger policies are issued."
