This time the issue was substantially and seriously. I am certain many were shocked with her admission that the practice of birth control with children from apartments.

\$1,800,000 Being Raised by K. of C. Educate War Orphans

NEW HAVEN, Conn. (UPI)—As a movement to raise \$1,800,000 which has entered the armed forces and particularly to those who have made the supreme sacrifice for their country, the Knights of Columbus in the United States are establishing an educational trust fund of one million dollars, with the plan of providing a higher education in a Catholic college for the sons and daughters of those Knights who have given their lives in the war.

John E. Swift, Deputy Supreme Knight and chairman of the committee on war activities, outlining the purpose of this fund, said: "These orphaned children might have received a college education had their fathers lived. Now they are entitled to know the great services our Knights had performed for which their fathers gave their lives."

At the close of the last world war the Knights established an educational program for returning service men, amounting to a sum total of about nine million dollars. They have given grants to the Catholic University of America for scholarships and have established post-graduate scholarships at Notre Dame University to the amount of \$100,000. A contribution of \$10,000 was made to the Knights of Columbus for the education of Negro children in the South.

MEXICO CITY (NC)—Small nations desire the triumph of justice and right, Alfonso Jimeno says in a comment on the Yalta Declaration published in Novedades, one of the leading daily of the capital. The Atlantic Charter, as far as Poland is concerned, he adds, has been "torn up."

"Half of Poland goes to Stalin. The other half remains in the hands of the Lublin Committee, invented by Stalin," Jimeno says. "One part will be territorially and absolutely a part of the U.S.S.R.; the other will be politically and ideologically a part of the U.S.S.R.—with all the bad consequences for the Polish nation, human rights and constitutional institutions. And this was agreed to without the heads of Poland and the legitimate Government."

With reference to "the cold and necessary demands of realism," Jimeno says: "Remember Munich." Apparently, he notes, neither Hitler poses nor satisfies appetites. "The German record on Poland," he continues, "does not even have the appearance of a democratic warlike; it represents the unshamed will of three men, or it would be better to say, the will of one man and the committee, to dominate of two."

Concerning the obligations and duties of small nations, or more specifically of Mexico, which in view of the recent war, Jimeno says: "It is worth mentioning we should be on the side of the weak by the strength of right by our wisdom and showed our own example."
