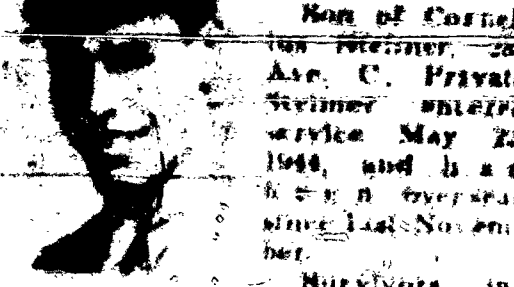

# 12 Catholics Give Lives, 9 Wounded, 2 Missing, 2 Prisoners in War Areas

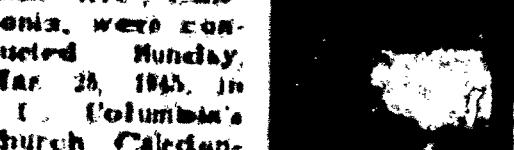
Twelve Catholic soldiers were killed, nine suffered wounds and two are missing in action, according to casualty reports for this week. Two others, who have been missing, are now listed prisoners.

Requiem Mass for Pfc. Owen J. ... who was killed in action Feb. 21, on Iwo Jima, was celebrated in St. Michael's church Monday morning, Mar. 26, 1945.



Survivors include Mrs. Artine Steiner, 26 Love St., two sons, Francis, 3, and Thomas, 2; two brothers, Cornelius and Benedict Steiner, and two sisters, Mrs. Helen Wiener and Mrs. Ruth Kuhn.

Memorial services for Capt. George W. Ball, 31, only son of Mr. and Mrs. George T. Hall, 23 East Ave., Caladonia, were conducted Sunday, Mar. 26, 1945, in St. Columba's Church, Caladonia.



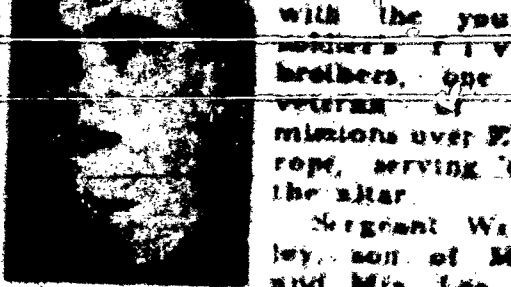
The ceremony was well attended and many representative citizens came to pay final tribute to Captain Ball, who died as a result of wounds suffered Mar. 2, in Germany.

A graduate of Notre Dame University, Class of 1936, the officer enlisted in the armed forces in April, 1941. Overseas since last September, he held command of a headquarters' company in the Lighting Division. He had been awarded the Bronze Star and Combat Infantryman's Badge.

Surviving besides his parents, are his wife, Mother Loughlin Ball, and daughter, Mary Kathryn, 20 months, in Wakefield, Mass.; a sister, Lt. (j. g.) Jeanne F. Ball, Cuddly Field, Corpus Christi, Tex., and grandfather, William H. Austin of Caladonia.

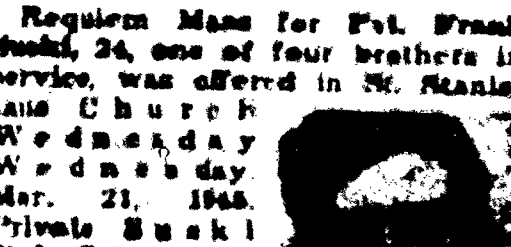
Pvt. Louis J. D'Agostino, 20, has notified his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Romaldo D'Agostino, 26 Lewis St., that he is a prisoner of the German government. He was previously reported missing in action in Belgium. A graduate of Corpus Christi he entered service in March, 1943, and went overseas last April with the Corps of Engineers. He earned the Purple Heart for wounds received in D-Day action. His brother, Pvt. Thomas D'Agostino, 22, is serving in Europe.

A memorial Mass for Sgt. Louis C. Wesley, 19-year-old ski trooper, who was killed in action Mar. 9 in Italy, was celebrated Wednesday morning in St. Andrew's Church, with the young soldier's five brothers, one a veteran of 33 missions over Europe, serving on the altar.



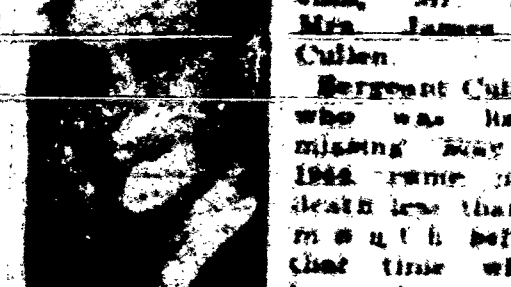
Survivors include his parents, five brothers, Lt. Leo J. Wesley, USAAF, home from the European front; Florian, Francis, Joseph and Clement Wesley, and six sisters, Rita, Theresa, Mary Anne, Marcia, Regina and Rose Anne Wesley.

Requiem Mass for Pvt. Frank Sushki, 24, one of four brothers in service, was offered in St. Stanislaus Church Wednesday, Mar. 21, 1945. Private Sushki died Feb. 12 in Belgium of wounds suffered in action two days earlier in Germany. A graduate of St. Stanislaus School, he is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Albin Sushki, 224 Newton St., six brothers, Pfc. Martin, R. St., Edmond and Pvt. John Sushki, both in England; Henry, Eugene and Daniel Sushki; and a sister, Genevieve Sushki, of Rochester.



Another parishioner of Our Lady of Mt. Carmel, Corporal Joseph G. ... who has suffered wounds in action, according to word received here. Overseas for two months, Corporal Bica was slightly wounded Jan. 4 in France, his sister, Miss Mary Bica, 133 Woodward St., has learned. He is the son of Mrs. Joseph Bica of the Woodward Street address. He entered service two years ago.

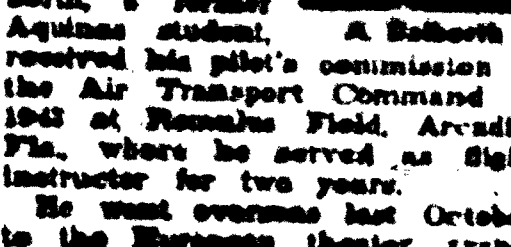
Tech. Sgt. John F. Cullen, an Aquinas graduate, has been killed in action in the European theater, the War Department has informed his parents, Mr. and Mrs. James J. Cullen.



Sergeant Cullen, who was listed missing May 4, 1944, came near death less than a month before that time when his plane was shot down.

Private Flying Fortress "Hearts and Flowers" was badly damaged by flak while he was serving aboard as radio runner. Sergeant Cullen had been in service more than two years and overseas since early in 1944.

Lt. Arthur C. Dalberth, 26, pilot of a C-47 transport, was killed Mar. 5 when his plane crashed over Kunning, China, according to word received by his wife, Mrs. Callie Mae Dalberth, 606 St. Paul St.



Requiem Mass will be offered in St. Mary's church Saturday, Apr. 14, at 8:30 a. m. Lieutenant Dalberth, a former Aquinas student, received his pilot's commission in the Air Transport Command in 1943 at Panama Field, Panama, Fla., where he served as flight instructor for two years.

He went overseas last October to the European theater, transferring to the India-China-Himalayas Division last month when he was based at Assam, India. Besides his wife, he leaves his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Charles Dalberth, 20 Pearl St.; a 2-month-old daughter, Pamela Gail; two brothers, Salvatore Dalberth and Charles Dalberth Jr.; and two sisters, Florence and Gloria.
