

Ukrainian Parish Welcomes New Pastor

Auburn — Welcome to Rev. William Ostach, new pastor of St. Peter and Paul Ukrainian Catholic Church and presentation of rings signifying 25 years of membership in the organization marked the annual dinner held at the Ukrainian National Club on Saturday. More than 250 men and women attended. Among the speakers were Father Ostach and Secretary Andrew Bishop.

Father Ostach was appointed pastor of St. Peter and Paul's Ukrainian Church to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Rev. Michael Lysiak who was pastor of the church for the past six years.

Four Soldiers Die, 4 Hurt in Action

Auburn — Four soldiers from Auburn area made the supreme sacrifice for their country and the sad tidings from the War Department, this week, brought the war toll in Auburn to 104 and the total killed in Cayuga County to 185. Four Auburn servicemen are reported as wounded in action.

Word came on Friday that Pfc. Donald T. Conroy had been killed in action in Germany on March 9. On Wednesday evening word came that Pfc. Alfred W. Hanson of the Army had been killed in action on February 12 on Luzon, P. I. The third soldier, Pfc. Alfred H. Gallagher, of the U. S. Air Corps, died at Fort Thomas, Ky., on March 17. The fourth Pfc. Edward H. Kuzal of the Army was killed in Luzon on February 23.

Pfc. Donald T. Conroy, son of Mr. and Mrs. Anthony J. Conroy and husband of Martha Dickson Conroy, Frazee Street, joined the U. S. Infantry on June 24, 1941, and went overseas in January, 1944. He was a graduate of St. Mary's Parochial School and of East High School. Pfc. Conroy's parents moved to Syracuse about two years ago.

Besides his wife and parents he is survived by a sister, Miss Margaret Conroy of Syracuse. He is a nephew of Gerald T. Conroy, organist of St. Mary's Church and well known in musical circles.

A memorial Mass for Pfc. Donald Conroy was offered at St. Mary's Church on Saturday morning at 12:10 o'clock.

Pfc. Alfred W. Hanson, 19, son of Mr. and Mrs. John W. Hanson, 15 Kate Street, was killed in action on February 12, on Luzon. The message of his death followed by the few days the telegram announcing that he was listed as missing in action. In addition to the telegram announcing the death of Alfred, Mr. and Mrs. Hanson were also advised by telegram that another son, Pfc. Norbert Hanson, 21, of the Army, had been wounded in action in Germany and was a patient in an army hospital in Paris, France.

Pfc. Norbert has been in the Army since 1942 and was home on furlough last Christmas, leaving for overseas duty in January.

Pfc. Alfred Hanson was born in Auburn on June 1, 1925. He attended St. Hyacinth's School and East High School and was a parishioner of St. Hyacinth's Church. He entered the army in October, 1942, and was sent overseas on June 4, 1944 arriving in New Guinea.

Pfc. Alfred is survived by his parents his brother, Norbert, a brother Ronald and a sister, Eleanor, all of Auburn.

A Memorial Mass for Pfc. Hanson was offered on Monday morning 8:30 at St. Hyacinth's Church.

Pvt. Alfred Gallagher, 24, of the Army Air Corps, was a native of Port Byron. He enlisted in the Air Corps in December, 1941, and now serves in the Tuscon Cavalry Base for 20 months and has been back in the States for about a year. The funeral was held from the home of his sister, Mrs. William J. Burns, 153 1/2 North Fulton Street, on Friday with services at St. John's Church in Port Byron. Rev. John Guy offered the requiem High Mass. Taps were sounded by Irene Parker of Port Byron. The bearers were Francis Smith, Francis Bugh and James Lynch of Port Byron and Russell, Richard and David Walker of Syracuse.

Pvt. Gallagher is survived by his sister and brother Daniel of Syracuse, N. Y., and his grandmother, Mrs. Sarah Walker of Auburn. Burial was in Mt. Pleasant Cemetery, Port Byron.

Pvt. Edward E. Kuzal of the Army left Auburn with the New York National Guard in 1940 and was killed in action on February 23 on Luzon, P. I. He has been overseas for about two years. He is survived by two sisters, Mrs. Charles Toban, 15 Carrow Street.
