Priest-Son Officially At Mrs. Hagerly Rites



Religious Freedom Hope Voiced for Russians

Washington (RNS) — Hope for "peaceful separation" of church and state in Russia and complete freedom of religion was voiced in a Vatican Radio German-language broadcast reported to the Federal Communications Commission here. Declaring that "there has been a change of the Russian Church's

attitude toward the government of the state directed by the Bolshevik party," the speaker, identified as the Rev. Wilhelm de Fries, said: "The negation emphasized in the early times of Patriarch Tikhon has been replaced by collaboration with the government. It had rather been hoped that there would evolve a relationship of peaceful separation and complete freedom of religion, something like the position in the United States."



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Gen. Arnold's Term Up as Chaplain Chief


Washington (RNS) — Maj. Gen. William R. Arnold, a Catholic who has served as Army Chief of Chaplains longer than any other man in the nation's history, has been given an important overseas inspection assignment and will be succeeded in office by an Episcopalian chaplain, Col. Luther D. Miller, veteran of 26 months of service in the Southwest Pacific.

A native of Weston, Ohio, General Arnold was ordained to the priesthood in 1908 after completing his studies at St. Bernard's Seminary, Rochester. The War Department stated that Gen. Arnold, whose second four-year term would have expired on next January 5, is leaving shortly on new statutory retirement age of 64 on June 12, but instead of returning to civilian life he will be continued on active service in his new capacity. In his new duties, Gen. Arnold will inspect all matters relating to the Chaplain Corps, in which he has served continuously for 35 years. His original appointment as Chief of Chaplains expired soon after Paul Miller and he was re-appointed for an additional four-year term on January 5, 1943.

Death Separates Twins in Storming Jap Prison

International Falls, Minn. (NC) — Death separated twin brothers, Merle and Berne Moore, when the American Prison Camp, the last of the hundreds of such camps, was stormed by the Japanese army at the town of Suiyong University in Suiyong. Over their 12-year term of life, the brothers had played together, studied together, worked together and often, for some time, went off to high school. Participating with the army and in the storming of the prison, Merle and Berne were separated.

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
