

Moscow Silent on Vatican Questions Flynn Brought

London (RNS)—Edward J. Flynn, personal envoy of President Roosevelt, carried a memorandum from the Vatican on his recent trip to Moscow which sought clear-cut replies by the Soviet government to three specific propositions regarding East European Catholics. It was learned from an authoritative source.

The memorandum, it is understood, requested:

1. Permission for Rome to send priests immediately to East European countries at present under Russian occupation.
2. Approval for the reopening of church institutions in those areas.
3. Assurance in regard to Russian intentions toward Italian prisoners in the U. S. S. R. Soviet Russia.

The reaction of Soviet Chief of Foreign Affairs Molotov was that the Soviet government could not possibly be entitled to ward East European Catholics before determining their sentiments toward Russian occupation authorities.

Indications were that while Premier Stalin is anxious to settle the status of Catholics in Poland and other occupied countries so as to avoid friction in those regions, a complicating factor is the strong opposition among Russians and other Orthodox churches to any dealings with the Pope.

Coming to Rome after his Moscow visit, Flynn was hopeful of speedy results from his talks with Russian leaders.

U.S., Britain Pressure Reds For Quick Polish Solution

Washington—(INS)—The United States and Great Britain are putting pressure on Russia for last-minute settlement of the Polish question.

Washington officials were frank in saying that unless the impasse on Poland can be broken in the next few days, it will cause a serious public rift in the Big Three entente.

British Foreign Minister Anthony Eden announced that Prime Minister Churchill will give the House of Commons a report next week on the Moscow

negotiations to form a new Polish government.

This is regarded in Washington as a warning to Stalin that unless the Polish stalemate is broken before that time, Churchill will put all the cards on the table in a way that will be embarrassing to the Soviet government.

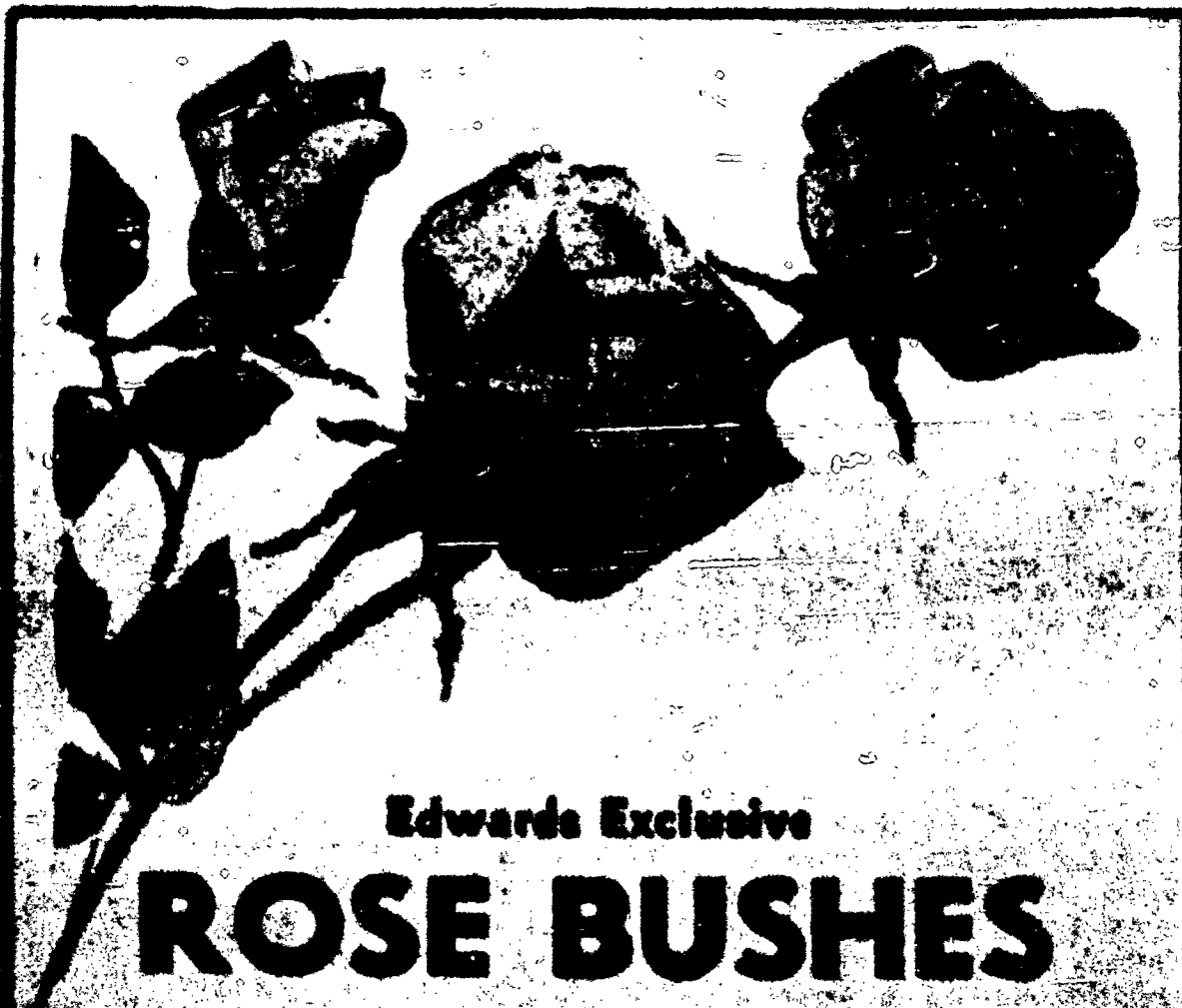
"Lithuania is undergoing a most terrible process of extermination," observes the exiled Lithuanian in his report to the Federation, based on letters and news broadcasts. "A casual line in one letter," he states, "said 200,000 were deported."
