**Bravery Wins Awards
For Two from Auburn**

Auburn—Recognition of bravery in action has come to two soldiers from this city serving on varied battle fronts.

Sgt. Arnold Starlock, son of Mr. and Mrs. Pasquale Starlock, has been cited for bravery and awarded the Bronze Star Medal. Starlock was wounded in action in the Louren battle in the Philippines in Jan. 31. He has been overseas for two years. His brother, Staff Sgt. Eddie M. Starlock is with the U. S. Air Corps in India and another brother, Pfc. Michael is with the infantry in Germany.

First Lt. Robert Dean, son of Mr. and Mrs. Edward Dean, 23 Doctor Avenue, who is serving with an Eighth Air Force Squadron in England, has been awarded the Air Medal. Dean, 21 years old and a pilot with the 501st Fighter Group. He is a graduate of Holy Family High School and received his commission and wings last April in Massachusetts. Pfc.

Two Auburnians Give Lives, One is Wounded

Auburn—Action in Germany has taken the lives of two Catholic soldiers from Auburn, and another has been wounded, war casualty reports reveal, this week.

Staff Sgt. John J. Poole, son of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Poole, Sr., 5 Central Avenue, was killed in action in Germany on March 18 according to an official report by the War Department. Sgt. Poole was born in Auburn, Oct. 20, 1915, and attended Holy Family School and High School where he was a member of the basketball team and one of its outstanding players. After leaving school in Auburn he attended Aquinas in Rochester. Sgt. Poole was inducted into the service in March 1941 and has been overseas since last August. He is survived by his parents; three sisters, Mrs. Mary Neidert of Rochester, Mrs. Verona Chomka of Syracuse and Mrs. Cecilia Hutton of Auburn; two brothers, Corp. Joseph Poole of the Army now in New Mexico and Pfc. Thomas Poole, Jr., in the Philippine Islands with the Army. A Memorial Mass will be offered in Holy Family Church on April 18.

Pfc. Joseph Feltz, 21, son of Mr. and Mrs. Pasquale Feltz, 79 Perrine Avenue, was killed in action in Germany on March 21. Pfc. Feltz had been in the Army for three years and has been overseas nearly two years. He was born in Auburn on Nov. 18, 1922, and attended local schools, graduating from West High School in 1942. He was a member of the Ukrainian National Club and was an outstanding basketball player.

Feltz was inducted into the Army Dec. 5, 1942, and went overseas in September 1943. He was in England first and later to France where he served as a member of an armored column and attached to the Seventh Army.

Pfc. Feltz is survived by two brothers, Corp. Michael Feltz, U.S. Naval Administration, and stationed at the Watertown, Mass. General Hospital; Corp. Sgt. John Feltz, U.S. Army who recently arrived home on leave after 20 months of overseas service; his parents, Italy, former residents of Auburn; his wife, Mrs. Pasquale Feltz, and their two sons, Pasquale and Joseph, sons of Alberto and Mrs.

Dr. Cowen Warns of 'Let Down' as Seventh War Loan Drive Opens

AUBURN—The Seventh War Loan Drive opened in Auburn, Monday, April 9, with a quota for Cayuga County of \$1,300,000. The total is an increase of 54% over the highest quota set in any War Bond Drive during the present war.

The drive was officially opened with a dinner meeting for committee heads held in the Osborne Hotel, Tuesday evening. Guest speaker was H. E. Elkina, ad Syracusian, radio news commentator and former war correspondent. He said that he feels the end of organized resistance in Europe is near but does not look for an end of the fighting for 12 or 16 weeks.

Introduced as the first speaker or the Rev. Dr. William E. Cowen warned against the danger to this country in any considerable "let down" in the war effort before the Japanese as well as the Nazis have been conquered. He said that since the men in our fighting forces are buying bonds out of their

pay why should we not continue to do the same. They are fighting and dying for us, and the least we can do is to buy bonds to the extent of our ability and to cooperate in every part of the war effort.

Doctor Cowen warned that

when V-E Day comes with Japan still to defeat it might well prove disastrous. He urged there must be no let down until the enemy in the Pacific had been defeated and peace assured.
