Pope Offers World Peace Prayer; Bishop Asks V-E Thanks Sunday

Exposition Of Eucharist Is Scheduled

As a public act of thanksgiving for the Allied victory in Europe His Excellency Bishop Kearney has requested the churches of the Diocese to hold public exposition of the Blessed Sacrament all day on Sunday.

This is in keeping with the Victory-in-Europe proclamation of President Truman who has appointed Sunday as a day of prayer and called upon Americans "whatever their faith, to unite in offering joyful thanks to God for the victory we have won and to pray that He will support us to the end of our present struggle and guide us in the way of peace."

er's Day" it is expected Catholics will receive Holy Communion in unprecedented numbers as they join with their fellow country men in a national day of prayer.

Officially proclaiming victory in Europe on Tuesday morning of this week President Truman stated:

"For the triumph of spirit and arms which we have won, and for its promise everywhere who join us in the love of freedom, it is fitting that we, as a Nation, give thanks to Almighty God, who has strengthened us and given us Victory."

The President also urged Americans to dedicate the national day of prayer on Sunday to the memory of "those who have given their lives to make possible our victory."

Reaction throughout the diocese to the official announcement of victory in Europe was prayerful and reverent.

Catholic schools remained in session. Teachers and pupils suspended classes during the day to offer prayers of thanksgiving in church.

Tolling of church bells signaled a day long pilgrimage of grateful Catholics who came to offer their silent prayers of thanksgiving.

In the evening all churches of the diocese held public services at which large crowds gathered.

Pontiff Calls For Early End Of War in East

Vatican City—(INS)—Pope Pius XII gave thanks yesterday that the war in Europe was finished and voiced a prayer for an early end of the conflict in the Far East.

In a peace message broadcast by the Vatican radio, the Holy Father said:

"At last this war is over. With our thanks goes a prayer for the end in the Far East also."

The Pontiff expressed the hope that a better Europe would be built over the ruins of war.

"The dead seem to call from their tombs, asking that out of their sacrifice a new and better Europe will arise," he said.

world which must now be rebuilt.

"Let us devote ourselves to the cause of a renaissance."

Pointing to the discord and hate sown by the war, the Pope declared that the people of Europe and the world must recover faith and unity.

"We feel," the Pope said, "that the fallen should admonish the survivors by saying:

"From our bones and tombs and the soil where we have been thrown let there rise the makers of a new and better Europe; a new and better universe founded on God's reverence, on loyalty to His commandments, on respect of human dignity, and on the holy principles of equality of the rights of all nations and all powers great and small, weak and strong."

"Our chant of grace is accompanied with a supplicant prayer imploring the Almighty for His divine goodness for an end according to justice of the bloody battle also in the Far East."

The Pope declared that the war had ended when the world had known in all
