Sergeant from Waverly Reported as Dead

Waverly — Sgt. Richard T.
Rynone, son of Mr. and Mrs.
Thomas Rynone of North Che-
mung street is officially presu-
med dead, the War Department
has notified his parents.

Sergeant Rynone, engineer
gunner on a Flying Fortress,
was listed missing in action on
May 8, 1944, when he was last
reported seen about 10 a. m.
somewhere southeast of Bremen
on a bombing mission to Bruns-
wick, Germany, via Berlin.

A graduate of Waverly Senior
high school, he joined the Army
Air Forces in April, 1942. He
arrived overseas a month before
the fatal mission.
