

Parish Protests Policy of Soviet Russia Appeasement

Trumansburg — A protest against an American policy of appeasement towards Soviet Russia was registered on Sunday with President Harry S. Truman by parishioners of St. James Church here.

It becomes "daily more apparent," the protest stated, that "Russia is about to bring into bondage some 200,000,000 people in Europe, the Near East, and the Middle East, besides her own 180,000,000."

Warning against this danger the people of St. James unanimously adopted the following message to the President:

The Honorable Harry S. Truman;

President of the United States, Washington, D. C.

Dear President Truman:

Since Russia stands for the opposite of everything that the United States has fought for in this war, she cannot be considered our ally except in a strictly military sense.

We, the people of St. James

Parish, Trumansburg, N. Y., ask you to bear this in mind at the meeting of the "Big Three" to be held in the near future that the United States may not play into the hands of Russia as it did into the hands of the Japanese before Pearl Harbor.

P.S. This letter was approved by the people of the parish by a rising-vote. The approval was unanimous.

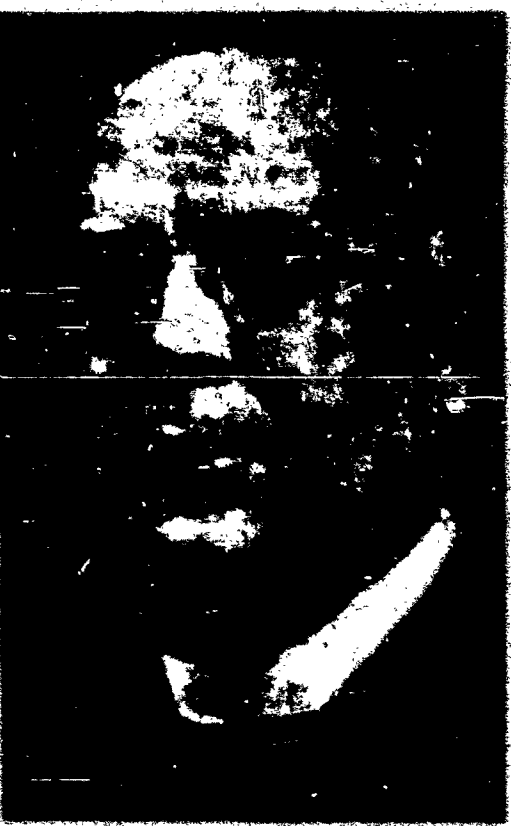
Coming G. I. Promoted V-E Day in France

Corning — Mrs. Thomas F. Roche, 317 E. High St., Painted Post, was notified recently that her son, Robert M. Roche, has been promoted from private first class to second lieutenant by order of General Dwight Eisenhower on V-E Day in France.

Upon receipt of the battlefield appointment, Lt. Roche left immediately for Germany. He had been serving as a French interpreter with Civil Affairs in the Army in France.

Entering the Army in March, 1942, Lt. Roche served at Mitchell Field for a time as a member of the Personnel Department. Later he was appointed to Princeton University for nine months and in March of last year was sent to England.
