

### 4 Geneva Priests Mark Anniversary

Geneva — Anniversary celebrations were the order of the day at St. Francis de Sales parish on Monday, June 11. The pastor, Rev. Edward K. Ball, observed his 24th anniversary in the priesthood on that day. Also celebrating were Rev. Valentine Jankowiak and Rev. Calogero Gerardi, assistants to the pastor, who marked their seventh year; Rev. William J. O'Brien, also assistant at St. Francis de Sales, celebrated his twelfth anniversary on Sunday, June 10.

A combined celebration was held on Sunday at an anniversary dinner at the rectory. A Mass in honor of the pastor's anniversary was celebrated on Monday morning.

Father Ball was ordained in St. Patrick's Cathedral in Rochester on June 11, 1921, and assigned to Aquinas Institute in that city, later coming to Geneva as principal of De Sales High School. He served parishes in Stanley and Dansville before coming to Geneva this year as pastor of St. Francis de Sales church.

Father Jankowiak was ordained on June 11, 1936, in Posén, Poland, and served at St. Stanislaus Church in Rochester until coming to Geneva in 1942.

Father Gerardi was ordained at Sacred Heart Church in Rochester, June 11, 1933, and was assigned to the Church of the Annunciation in that city, later serving at St. Francis of Assisi Church in Auburn prior to being assigned to Geneva this year.

Father O'Brien was ordained on June 10, 1933, in St. Patrick's Cathedral in Rochester, and after serving at Holy Cross Church at Charlotte came to Geneva in 1936.

### 20,435,419 Catholics Listed in Britain

New York — (NC) — A booklet entitled "Catholics in Britain Today" has been published by the British Information Services here. The booklet notes that the Catholic population in the entire British Commonwealth is 20,435,419, and that there are 1,345 Catholic elementary schools with about 879,000 pupils, and 559 secondary schools with about 61,000 pupils, in England and Wales. It also states that 1,275 of the elementary and 95 of the secondary schools are government-aided.

Sister Mary Barbara is survived by a sister, Mrs. Cecelia Nothnagle, and several nieces and nephews of Rochester. A Solemn High Mass of Requiem was sung on Tuesday morning in St. Anthony's Chapel in St. Anthony's Convent, Syracuse and was attended by nuns from Auburn. Burial was in Assumption Cemetery, Syracuse.
