

Camp Stella Maris Opening Set July 1

Highlighting activities this season at Camp Stella Maris, diocesan camp on the east shore of Conesus Lake, will be a special Field Mass to be sung on the grounds, Wednesday, July 4.

The camp will open for the season on Sunday, July 1 with a capacity group of girls from Rochester and vicinity.

Encampments this year will consist of two two-week periods for girls during the month of July, and two two-week periods for boys in August.

Camp Director, the Rev. Walter A. Fischer, announces that Scoutmasters from St. Andrew's and St. Bernard's Seminarian will serve as counselors for the boys' encampments.

Miss Ruth Eismann will again head the counselors of trained young women for the girls. Miss Mary Louise McIntire will be in charge of the Crafts and Arts, with the Misses Eileen McCarthy and Esther Straube serving as instructors.

Supervising waterfront activities and swimming will be Miss Sally Shipton, assisted by the Misses Mary Ellen Treseott, Alison Cleary, Mariene Butler, Mary Lou Shipton. Canteen and Registration will be managed by Miss Mary Louise McIntire.

Sports and games will be conducted by Miss Josephine Tantalos and Miss Patricia Quigley. Miss May Kelley will head the Dramatics, and Miss Lucille McMahon will organize Illkes and Nature Study. The Stella Maris Press Club, which issues a daily camp bulletin as well as the regular Camp paper, "Star Dust," will be under the leadership of Miss Shirley Mack.

Miss Rose Tantalos, R. N., will return as camp nurse.

The regular active camp program of swimming, boating, craft, and so forth, will be conducted. Archery will be offered at Stella Maris for the first time this year. Skits and campfires will comprise the evenings' programs.

In spite of the destruction of the Chapel of St. Jude by the high winds this past winter, Mass will start each day's activities in the large Administration Building.

Schools Buy \$343,823.19 In 7th War Loan Bonds

Turning in a total of \$343,823.19 in the Seventh War Loan, children of Rochester's Catholic Schools have sold a grand total to June 12, 1945, of \$1,542,545.31 in War Bonds and stamps, the Catholic Education Office reported this week.

The total to May 1 was \$1,491,702.12 and covered the following periods and amounts: Dec. 1, 1941 to March 1, 1943, \$446,650.00; Sept. 1943 to June, 1944, \$433,845.45; July 1, 1944 to Dec. 31, 1944, \$246,721.56 and Jan. 1, 1945 to May 1, 1945, \$219,655.56.

Sister of St. Joseph Rites Held Tuesday

Funeral services for Sister M. Cortona Heimpel who died at Nazareth Convent, Pittsford, Sunday, June 24, 1945 were held at nine o'clock Tuesday morning, June 26 from the Nazareth Convent Chapel in Pittsford.

Solemn Mass of Requiem was celebrated by the Rev. John J. Naoca assisted by the Rev. Roy Morphy, Deacon; the Rev. John A. Morgan, Sub-deacon; the Rev. Edward J. Lintz, Master of Ceremonies.

Present in the sanctuary were the Rev. Louis Edelman, the Rev. Joseph Gefell, the Rev. Michael J. Krieg, and the Rev. Vincent P. McCorry, S.J., of Buffalo.

The blessing at the grave was given by the Rev. Joseph H. Gefell assisted by the Rev. Edward J. Lintz.

A native of Germany, Sister Cortona entered the Order of the Sisters of St. Joseph in 1903. She spent many years as housekeeper at St. Joseph's Convent, Wayland, St. Alphonsus Convent, Auburn, Our Lady of Perpetual Help Convent, Rochester and Nativity Convent, Brockport.

She is survived by one brother and two sisters.

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Schools Offered Movie Service

The Victor Motion Picture Service of Elmira announces a new visual education program planned especially for the Parochial Schools of Rochester Diocese. This program uses sound motion pictures and slidefilms.

Slidefilms which are rapidly replacing the glass slides are made up of several pictures on a roll of film. These pictures when shown through a light weight inexpensive projector give the school children a visual image which is retained for a long period of time. Among the slidefilms available is a series called "The Catechism in Pictures." Others are: "The Ceremonies of the Roman Rite"; "The Vestments of the Roman Rite"; and "The Stations of the Cross" in Kodachrome.

Catholic schools are also using this new service to show Legion of Decency approved films in the school hall.

The Victor Motion Picture Service, under the management of J. Gerald Loughlin, offers a free advisory service to all Parochial Schools of this diocese. This service has the approval of the Superintendent of Catholic schools. Mr. Loughlin will be glad to give a free demonstration of his program to any parish.

Five Rochester seniors will receive degrees at the 1945 commencement exercises of Marquette University in Milwaukee, Wis., July 1 in Milwaukee Auditorium's main hall.
