Sunday, Aug. 5—A nice, big, busy morning for the girls of the Sodality of St. Michael's Church, who served 165 servicemen. And by 9:30 a. m. one hundred of them had

already eaten! So, as you can see, the girls would have had good reason to be weary.

Apparently they weren't, however, for the end of serving found all the girls gathering round the piano for the usual songfest and fun. A five-piece orchestra added to the gaiety, and the morning ended with the floor thronged with dancers. A good time for everybody Sunday.

It turned out to be one of those mornings when most of the boys who visited us were of the older group — men who had come back from overseas duty, or who had only recently been called into service. It is strange to realize on walking into the "breakfast room" that one can at a glance characterize the group as being "older" (by five to 10 years) or "younger" — the latter being often boys just out of boot camp. The youngsters, of course, are the ones that make the walls tremble when they start in to jitterbug.

One of our guests Sunday was

a Canadian Army man named Simpson. Simpson with 40 years of service behind him, is a regimental sergeant-major, the highest rank an enlisted man can achieve, which means that he gives orders daily to about 180 noncoms under him. "The best berth in the Army," he opines.

Three of his sons and one daughter are in service, the oldest son having joined the regular army, and holding the rank of an acting captain, he enlisted 14 years ago and came up through the ranks, and is his father proud of him! The second son, it seems, is mechanically inclined, and anxious to leave service and get into his favorite field; but the third son, like the oldest one, is also fond of army life and has decided to make it his profession.

Then there is the elder daughter, who enlisted in the Canadian

Women's Army. Visiting Rochester with Sergeant-Major Simpson was his wife and younger daughter, who is 19 and finding it difficult to restrain herself until she is 21, the minimum enlistment age. The two visited the Canteen for breakfast after we insisted that the sergeant-major bring them, and they enjoyed seeing an establishment which, to them, was quite unique.
