

Notre Dame Sent 8,675 Into Service; 267 Killed

Notre Dame, Ind. (NC) — (NC) Together with the announcement that the Navy V-12 program will be continued at the University of Notre Dame in the semester beginning November 1, the Rev. J. Hugh O'Donnell, S.C., president, also released a report on Notre Dame's contribution to the war effort, made to the university's committee on post-war problems.

The report discloses that of 8,675 alumni and former stu-

dent of Notre Dame in the armed forces, 267 have made the supreme sacrifice. 36 members of the faculty enlisted or left for research work in connection with the war effort. Seven of them are members of the Congregation of Holy Cross, who entered the service as chaplains.

The training station at Notre Dame was commissioned a United States Naval Reserve Midshipmen School in October, 1942, the report states, and

trainees remained at the university for a complete four-month course leading to their commissions. About 10,000 naval trainees have been commissioned ensigns in the Naval Reserve at the University.

Another naval training program, which more completely utilized the facilities of Notre Dame, was inaugurated in July, 1943, in the form of the naval V-12 program. Father O'Donnell says: While midshipmen are taught by naval officers, the V-12 since 7,000 of whom have received training to date, attend regular university classes and are taught by Notre Dame professors.

"But all on the Notre Dame campus was not military," the report continues. "In the many laboratories at the university, Notre Dame scientists and engineers were busily engaged in numerous research programs at the request either of the government or private industry engaged in war production.

"In the physics laboratory, scientists were, and still are, involved in experiments with the development of atomic energy. As was seen in the closing days of the war, this atomic energy is one of the most powerful forces in the world."
