All the ships flew their largest ensigns and blew their whistles and sirens in honor of the occasion. The Mighty Missouri tooted its whistles with such gusto that the whistle stuck and continued to toot until the engineer could make minor repairs."

Two of Seaman Bonomo's brothers are in the service. Sgt. Louis, now stationed in Independence, Kas., after serving 20 months in Italy, and Pfc. Arthur, on Okinawa, who has been in the Pacific area for the past 18 months. Another brother, James Bonomo, was recently discharged from the Army.
