

### Vatican Terms Warsaw Motives as Invalid

Ordinary and has a provisional character to meet special circumstances. In Poland, the Deacon of Culma was entrusted to the Apostolic Administration of the nearby German Bishop of Danzig, specifically for the very reason that the Ordinary of Culma was impeded in the exercise of his office. He had been forced to flee and a great many of his priests had been deported.

For similar reasons, an Apostolic Administrator had been appointed for the Wartegau to care for German Catholics because the German authorities absolutely forbade Polish priests to minister to Germans, even at the time of death.

Thus, it was pointed out, in both instances the Church was clearly exercising her care for the welfare of souls. Moreover, she could do so freely since Concordats never contemplate any negotiations between governments and Church in the matter of appointing Apostolic Administrators.

Furthermore, it was said here, the Warsaw Government should recognize the fact that the Holy See, rather than appoint German Bishops as the German Government desired at the time, preferred to let many dioceses remain vacant. On this very subject there is in existence a note sent by the Holy See to the German Government which was published at the time in the United States.

In this note, which was signed by Cardinal Luigi Maglione, then Papal Secretary of State, the German Government was rebuffed in its demand to pass upon the appointment of Archbishops and Bishops and other Ordinaries not only in Germany itself but also in German-occupied territories, including Poland.

The statement issued by the Warsaw Government says that it will not recognize the appointments of Apostolic Administrators effected on August 15 of this year. In this connection it was pointed out by the Holy See that no such nominations were made.
