The liturgical custom of the Red Mass inaugurated in New York City in 1928 goes back many years in the history of the church, but the exact origin is somewhat obscure.

Historians record that in the reign of Edward I, King of England, who was crowned in Westminster Abbey on August 18, 1274, and died in 1307, there were twelve judges of the High Court who sat in the King's Court at Westminster.

Of these twelve judges (all of them doctors of law) ten were priests and canons of the cathedral chapter of Saint Paul's in the city of London, and it seems that these canons of Saint Paul's who were also the King's judges, attended a Red Mass at the opening of the judicial year.

There is early historical evidence of the Red Mass having been celebrated in Paris and in Rome. In this country it has spread and is now annually celebrated in California, Illinois, New York, Pennsylvania and the District of Columbia.

With the Feast of St. Michael the Archangel, Michaelmas marking the opening of the parliamentary year, the judicial year and the academic year, the Red Mass is celebrated closed to the Sept. 29 feast. In Rochester the Red Mass will open exactly on the feast.

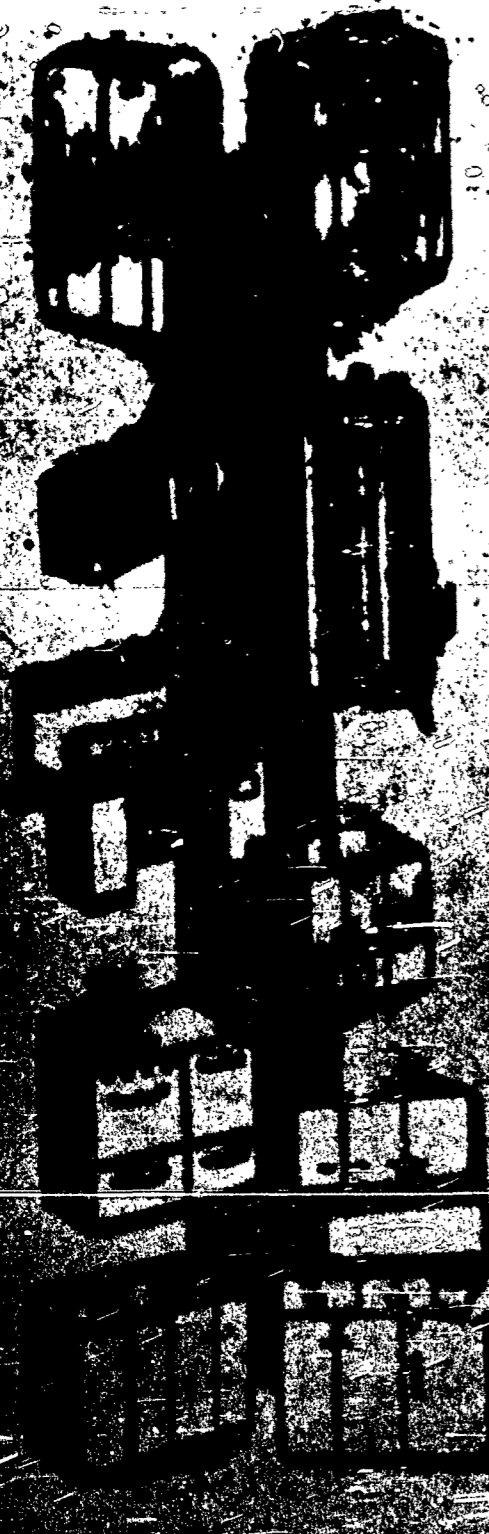
