## 2 Earn Bronze Star Medals On Medical Duty in Pacific

Auburn — Capt. Darrell D. Althouse, a medical officer serving with the 37th Infantry Division on Luzon has been awarded the Bronze Star Medal. He has also earned the Medical Badge, and both the Asiatic Pacific Theater and the Philippine Liberation Ribbons with battle stars.

He left the states in October 1943 and joined his unit in the Solomon Islands. His wife lives at 34 East Genesee St. Dr. Althouse received the Bronze Star for maintaining a First Aid Station under enemy fire during the battle for Manila.

Pfc. Claude Dwyer, 7 Hubbard Street has been awarded the Bronze Star medal for heroic achievement with the 33rd Infantry Division to which he was attached with a medical detachment. He has served overseas 22 months and is now stationed in Japan. He has three brothers serving with the forces, all having served overseas. Another brother, Daniel who served 2½ years in the army has just received his honorable discharge.

Frank A. Kulakowski, C.S.K., son of Mrs. Margaret Kulakowski, Cottage St., serving on the U. S. S. Pamuna, A. K. A., is stationed with the Third Amphibious Force in the Tokyo area and is one of the first to go to Tokyo. The Auburn boy has participated in the battles of New Caledonia, Samara in the Philippine Islands, Manacini, Balayag, Luzon, Batangas, Manila, Guam, Saipan and Okinawa. One of the first sights he noted when entering Tokyo was the Emperor's palace.

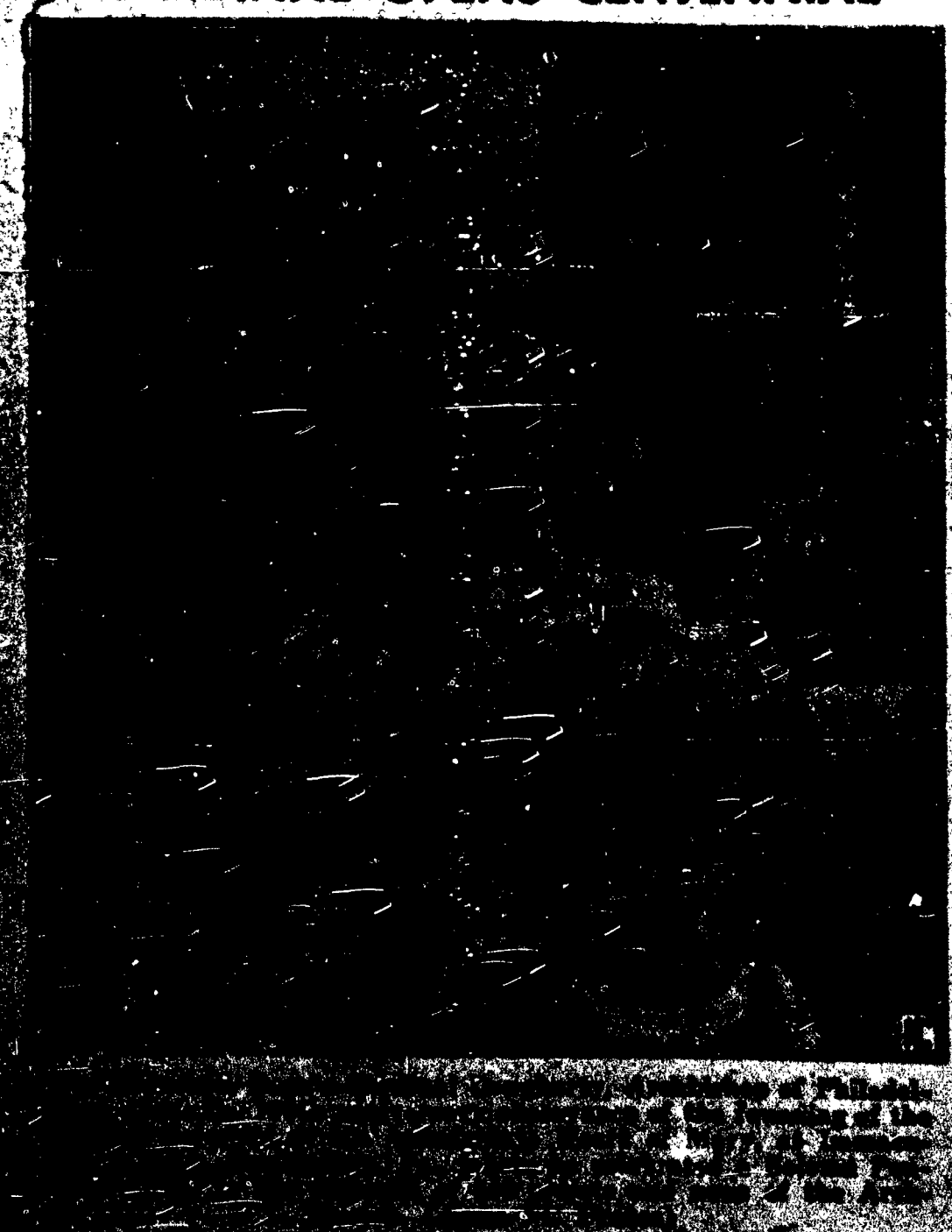
