Weather and Fighting Seneca Falls Sailor Revealed as Serving Behind Enemy Lines

Seneca Falls — Among the "now it can be told" bits of information to reach home, one concerns Pharnoch's Mate 1/c James E. Carnavale, USNR, son of Mr. and Mrs. John Carnavale, 19 Haigh St. James was a member of a Naval group serving as guerillas, intelligence agents and weather observers behind the Japanese lines in Asia, according to officials.

This group is called the Signal Announcements by Naval of American Cooperative Organization. It began as a weather reporting unit and progressed to a point where it was supplying the U. S. Fleet, the Army's 14th Air Force and the Chinese and American Army headquarters with weather reports and information on movement of Japanese troops and supplies.

Finally, it became a dangerous fighting outfit, working devastation wherever it struck, and extending its activities from Indo-

China to the Gobi Desert. SAGO Intelligence allowed the Air Force to mine coastal waters, forcing Jap ships out to sea, where they were at the mercy of American submarines. Weather information helped the Navy decide when invasions were favorable and when to raid Jap homeland.

James is a graduate of St. Patrick's school and Mynderse Academy and has been in the Navy for the past 3 years.
