Society's 50 Year At St. Casimir's History Reviewed

Fifty years' history of the St.
Casimir's Church Rosary Society
was reviewed at the Golden Jubilee
Banquet of the organization,
held in the St. Casimir's School,
Sunday evening, Oct. 7.

To commemorate Rosary Sun-
day and their Jubilee, members
of the Society received Holy
Communion in a body at the 8
o'clock Mass, which was cele-
brated by Rev. L. J. Szczepanski,
pastor.

Flowers purchased by the So-
ciety decorated the church altars.

The banquet was attended by
seventy-five members. Mrs. Paul
Rozdal, president, reviewed the
progress of the Rosary Society
from its origin to the present
time, and reported during the
past half century, the organiza-
tion has had only three presi-
dents, all of whom are living.

Mrs. Catherine Nowakowski, one
of the charter members and the
first president of the Society,
was unable to attend the ban-
quet because of illness. Also ab-
sent from the gathering was
Mrs. Apollonia Jankowski, who
was elected president in 1912,
and was succeeded by Mrs. Roz-
dal in 1935, after 23 years of
service. The oldest living mem-
ber of the Society, Mrs. Mary
Krovetz, of Brooklyn, was also
unable to attend.

A blessing upon all members
was bestowed by the Most Rev.
James E. Kearney, Bishop of
Rochester, in the form of a mes-
sage which was read at the ban-
quet. In the letter, His Excel-
lency expressed regret because
of his inability to join the mem-
bers in their celebration, and ex-
tended his congratulations and
best wishes for the continued
success of the organization. Other
messages of congratulation
were received from Rev. Joseph
A. Balcerak, pastor of St. Stanislaus
Church, Rochester, and from Rev.
Dr. Stanley B. Krolak, of the faculty of St.
Bernard's Seminary.

Speakers at the dinner includ-
ed the Rev. L. J. Szczepanski,
pastor, Rev. Stanley Bialaszewski,
pastor of St. Stanislaus
Church, Bradford, Rev. Joseph
Plorkowski, C. M., of the Fa-
thers of St. Vincent de Paul, who
is conducting a Mission at St.
Casimir's this week, and Rev.
John E. Ciechanek, assistant pas-
tor.

The St. Casimir's Rosary So-
ciety was organized in 1895 by
Rev. John C. Gulcz, then pastor
of the local church, and now
pastor of St. Hedwig's Church,
Wilmington, Delaware. The or-
ganization has been prominently
associated with the history of
the church during the past fifty
years, and has a membership of
more than one hundred women
of the parish.

Results of Burial Urn Study Waited in Crucifixion Story

Jerusalem — (RNS) — Eleven
early Christian burial urns,
which archeologists say may pro-
vide the oldest record of Chris-
tianity, have been discovered in
a cave on the Jerusalem-Bethle-
hem road. Inscriptions on the
urns contain an historical con-
firmation of the trial and cruci-
fixion of Christ.

The inscriptions, dating from
the First Century, A. D., are in
Hebrew and Greek, and are said
to be lamentations by Jewish dis-
ciples on the passion and death
of Christ, set down perhaps by
an eye-witness to the crucifixion.
They have not yet been fully
translated.

Other articles found with the

urns, including pottery, lamps
and bottles, will be studied, Pro-
fessor Sukenik, director of an-
tiquities at Hebrew University
here, announced.

"At present," he said, "it is
only possible to say that the in-
scriptions on the urns date from
the period immediately preced-
ing the destruction of the second
temple in 70 A. D."

Circulation Rises Among Catholic Czech Publications

Prague — (NC) — A remark-
able revival in the field of Cath-
olic journalism, with many
publications — three of them
dailies — enjoying vast increases
in circulation, has taken place
in Czechoslovakia since that
country's liberation.

The record increases in the
circulation of Catholic publica-
tions are traced to the fact that
an overwhelming majority of
Czechs are conservative and dem-
ocratic, looking forward to the
reestablishment of a true dem-
ocracy such as existed before
the war and disliking dictator-

Catholic Programs On Prague Radio

Prague — Catholic action
broadcasts by Radio Prague,
which were prohibited by the
Nazis during the war, were be-
gun again September 28, the
feast of St. Wenceslaus, patron
saint of the nation.
