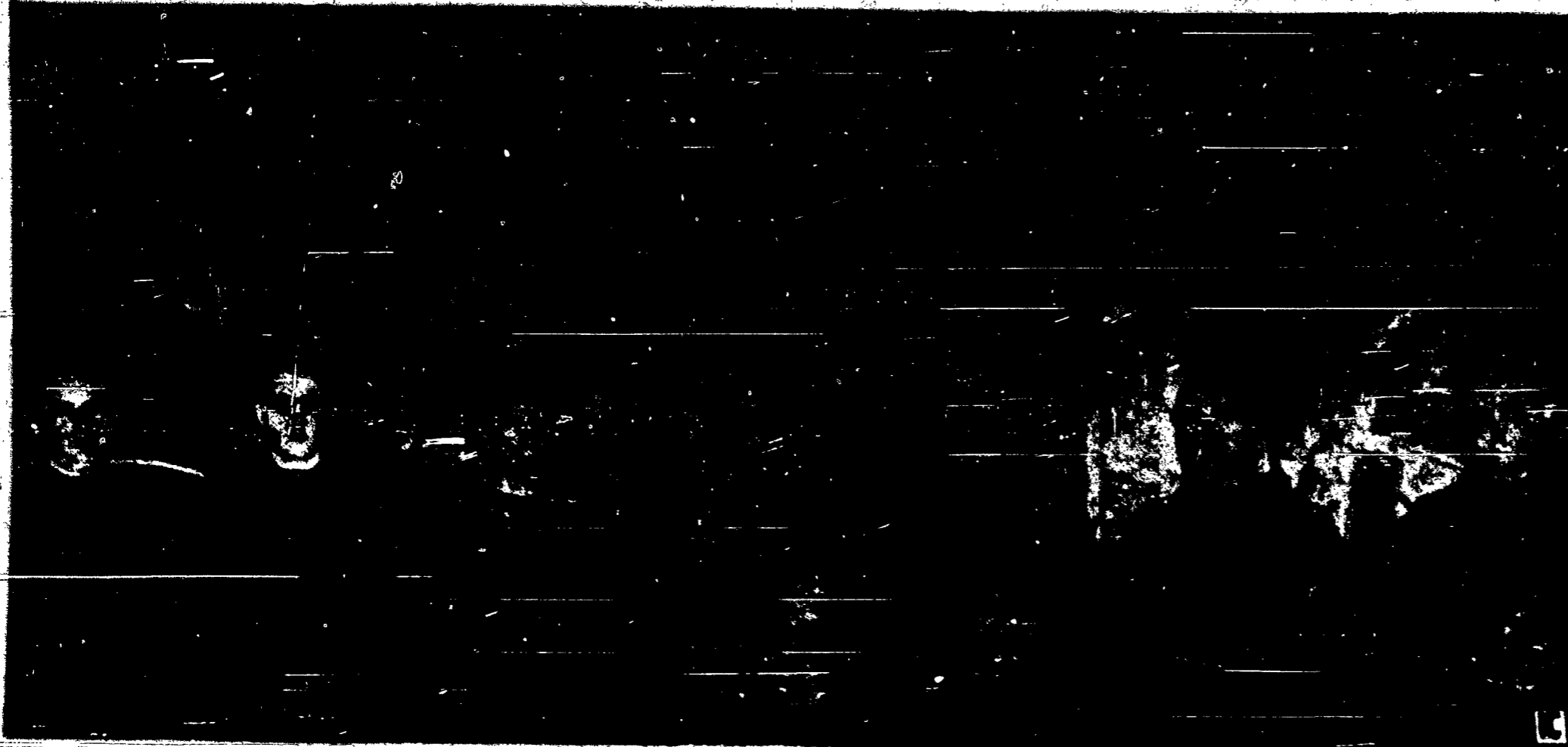


PAPAL DELEGATE BLESSES DEPARTING MISSIONARIES

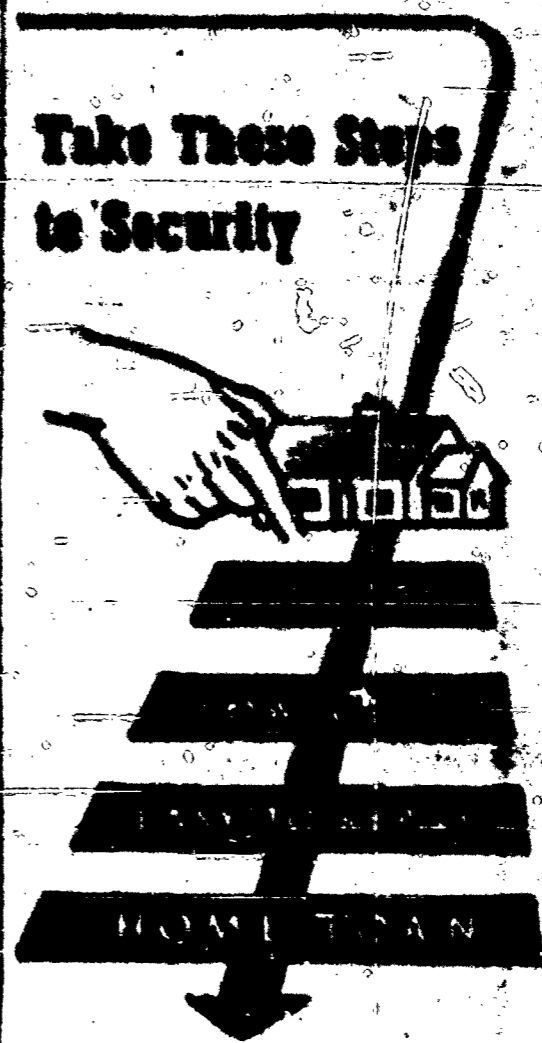

Knights Hear Plea to Spur Catholic Lay Activity

Corning — At the annual Columbus Day banquet of the Corning Council, Knights of Columbus, held Thursday evening, Oct. 11, at the Baron Steubert Hotel, about 150 mem-

bers, wives and guests heard the Rev. William J. Sutherland, assistant pastor of St. Mary's Church, Niagara Falls, make an urgent plea for a return to the path of religiosity. Father Sutherland said in part: "Today the world needs the Knights of Columbus and it needs activity on the part of the Catholic laity. The priests can reach only a limited number of people but the laity represented by the Knights can meet and associate with everyone and more closely transmit the teachings of the mother church.
