

Notre Dame Head Backs Research Bill

Washington — (NC) — Citizens of the United States must be realistic while striving for the difficult and evanescent goal of idealism, the Rev. J. Hugh O'Donnell, C.S.C., president of the University of Notre Dame, declared in his testimony before the Senate Commerce Committee here in support of the Magnuson Bill, which seeks establishment of a national research foundation.

Father O'Donnell recalled that he had "applauded the Atlantic Charter, such as it was, and subscribed to the lofty aims of the San Francisco Conference." "Yet I believe," he said, "that while we strive for the difficult and evanescent goal of idealism we must be realistic, the world being what it is, and not what we want it to be. I am not too sanguine about the future because, to quote Dr. Isaiah Bowman, 'The war is not over; only the military phase of it.' The biological phase continues; and this phase has yet to be won."

Father O'Donnell pointed out that while the Magnuson Bill may suggest a departure from the traditional relationship of American universities to the government, changing times of necessity bring corresponding changes in methods. He emphasized that he was supporting the measure for one reason only. "In view of what is happening in the world today," he said, "I believe that it is necessary for the national defense. If it were not for this consideration I would oppose unalterably government assistance."

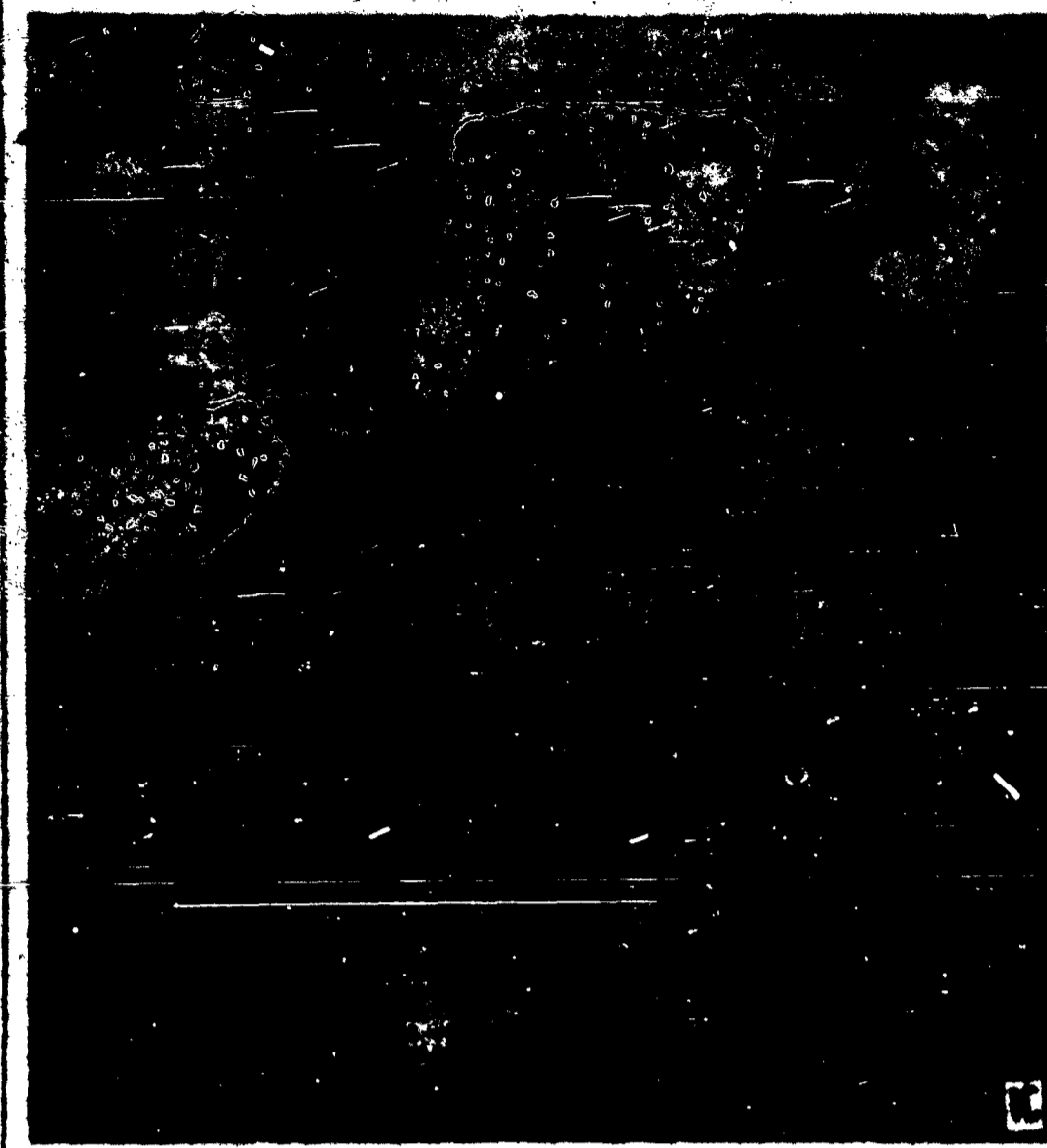

Notre Dame, Ind. — All relations with our fellowmen and with God must be governed by a code of right living built on the virtues of prudence, justice, fortitude and temperance, the Rev. George I. Smith, O.P., associate professor of engineering at the University of Notre Dame, here, told graduates at the Fall convocation.

Fifty-eight undergraduate de-

grees were awarded, 15 of which were bachelor of science degrees to students now in medical and dental schools. The graduate school of the university conferred 17 degrees, including a doctor of philosophy, eleven master of arts degrees, one master of science, and four master of science degrees in education.

Albany Coadjutor Is Consecrated

New York — The Most Rev. William A. Sully, a native New Yorker, was Consecrated Coadjutor Bishop of Albany and Titular Bishop of Phoenicia Wednesday morning in St. Patrick's Cathedral.

The consecration took place in the presence of four archbishops and 17 bishops. Gov. Thomas E. Dewey looked on from a box and city officials and clergymen looked on.

Archbishops, Bishops and Pa-

pal Knights took part in the pontifical procession.

Archbishop Francis J. Spellman presided, while Bishop Edmund D. Gibbons, of Albany, consecrated the new bishop. He was assisted by Bishop Thomas H. Malloy of Brooklyn and Bishop Eugene J. Hallinan of Ogdensburg, N. Y.

Among members of the hierarchy present was the Most Rev. James E. Neasey, Bishop of Rochester.
