

Urge Development of German And Japanese Industries

Manchester, N. H. — (RNS) — Development under temporary control of an Allied commission, of German and Japanese industries "compatible with world security and international stability," was urged by the New England Catholic Students Peace Federation at its annual convention here.

The Federation also called upon the U. S. in its foreign policy to stand firm in applying the principles of the Four Freedoms equally to all nations, "as against imperialistic and communistic ideologies."

Delegates from 17 New Eng-

land colleges recommended that the Pacific Islands be given full autonomy and be retained under protection of the U. S., assisted by an advisory council of the United Nations Organization until such time as they are able to govern and defend themselves.

Finding out that many of the "problems in this country are due to complete confusion in people's minds," Joseph P. Kennedy, former ambassador to Great Britain, urged the delegates to redouble their efforts "to know a great deal more about what's going on in this country."

'Paradise on Earth' Play Depicts Civic Center Life

Rochester's Columbus Civic Center, headquarters of Catholic activity and diocesan offices, may be the subject of a forthcoming New York stage play according to intimations made in Sunday's Democrat and Chronicle by that newspaper's theater critic George L. David.

Mr. David's interesting revelation is contained in a letter which he received from Harry Shale, currently engaged in playwriting in New York and formerly a desk clerk at the Columbus Civic Center.

Stating that he has written a play about the Columbus Civic Center entitled "Paradise on Earth," Mr. Shale adds that it has caught the interest of a well-known New York producer.

Shale who spent three years in Hollywood, has several plays to his credit including "Follow the Crowd" which was produced in Larchmont, N. Y.

He returned to his home in Rochester in the early part of the war to revise a play which he had written called "Kitten." When ill health prevented him from working in a defense factory he was offered a position at the Civic Center by the Rev. Gerald C. Lambert, director.

"This," relates the playwright, "not only secured me in a job, wherein I could continue revisions of my play, but also meant I could enjoy the confidence and friendship of just about the world's loveliest people."

"In behalf of folks like Flor-

ence Krewer, Helen Castello, Ed Rigney, Miss Weis and the hotel's beloved night watchman, 'Pikey,' I wrote a play about the Knights of Columbus entitled 'Paradise on Earth,' which has caught the interest of Kermit Bloomgarden, producer of the new hit 'Deep Are the Roots.'

The persons recalled here by Mr. Shale are all popular members of the personnel which directs the Civic Center.

In the casting it was suggested this week that "Pikey's" role be given Barry Fitzgerald.

CDA Heed Appeal For Aid to Nuns

New York — (NC) — An urgent appeal to speed up efforts on behalf of the war-stricken children, women and nuns in devastated Europe, China and the Philippines went out to more than 1,500 courts of the Catholic Daughters of America from the organization's headquarters here this week.

Miss Mary C. Duffy, Supreme Regent, requested that members cooperate with the Catholic sponsoring group in their respective area in the sewing of garments for children; collecting shoes, under and night garments for destitute nuns in the war-ravaged areas and similar projects.

The nation-wide appeal was launched among Catholic women's organizations through the National Council of Catholic Women in cooperation with War Relief Services-National Catholic Welfare Conference.

Protestant Back United Nations New York — (NC) — The Most Rev. Robert E. Lucey, Archbishop of San Antonio, and the Most Rev. Francis J. Haas, Bishop of Grand Rapids, were among a group of 19 prominent Americans issuing a statement here urging immediate establishment of the United Nations Organization and taking exception to proposal made earlier in the month at Dublin, N.H. that the UNO be scrapped in favor of a world government.
